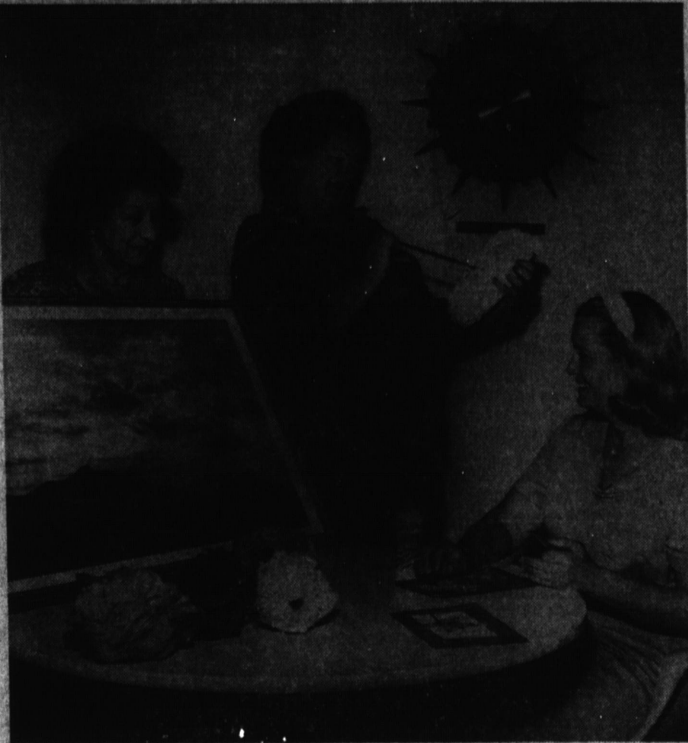

There can be humor in Greek tragedy when Angie Papadakis does MEDEA from the standpoint of "How To Solve The Teenage Problem" and "Oedipus Rex And His Complex" from the standpoint of "How Far Afield Was Freud." She has special material for all special occasions — ranging from thank-you notes and excuses to Mother's Day and Lincoln's Birthday. Mrs. Papadakis has also contributed to numerous national publications.
