The old-fashioned package The old-fashioned package of ironing starch is giving way to a new breed of aero-sol-packaged ironing aids. These will make your Monday ironing chore easier, but you will have to learn how to shop for them. One of the first things to One of the first things to

do before you buy, says Steele Elmi, who is manager of research and development for the aerosol division of Scovill Manufacturing Company, is to read the directions on the label carefully,

If the can is marked "na tural starch," it's best suited for shirts and blouses where "soft hand" is desired.

IF THE LABEL indicates a synthetic type of starch, it's best used for little girls' party dresses, puffed sleeves, or for slips worn beneath bouffant skirts, things where a more permanent starched finish is needed. In between the hard and

soft finishes are the aerosols labeled "ironing aids." These will give a shiny and smooth finish to the fabric.

Also, look for the fatiguerelief button engineered into some of the newer aerosols. "The average housewife presses the actuator button on the aerosol can a minimum of

30 times an hour in the home laundry," says Steele. "If her finger is working a straight up-and-down button on the can it will get a lot more tired than it does pressing the so-called "tilt" (slant-top) button, which needs low pressure.

American homes, like the nation's airlines, appear to be aiming more and more for "on-time" operation. That's the conclusion to be drawn from statistics reported by a
