I recall these two incidents as examples of announcers who are masquerading as newsmen. They neither gath-ered the news nor did they write it. The TV announcer didn't even have the brains to da a good job of cheating by rewriting the opening to say "HERE in San Francisco to-night." He merely ripped a night." He merely ripped a piece of wire copy out of the teletype machine and read it. This has a direct bearing on the strike of the network radio and TV news personnel.

THE comparatively few TV newsmen who write what they read do not like to be con-fused with the "rip-and-read" newscasters. They take pride in being craftsmen with words. This is admirable in words. This is admirable in as much as it is difficult for anyone outside the newsroom to tell the difference and I have a hunch the average viewer doesn't care. Even truthfully, he probably more never thought a newscaster wrote anything anyway. This is where the newsman

is different from the newsman gets the news and writes it; the news caster casts it forth over the air. But the third man in this team is the newsman who as-sembles and composes the news but does not voice it. In the complex network news gathering departments there are over a hundred such men who work with their heads and their pencils. They must
