subscribing my name:

"Yes! I have just read your exciting offer and agree that it is unsurpassed in record club history, use I can choose from 250 hit songs per month, including TOP HITS, TOP STARS from Broadway, Hollywood and TV. If I do not think this is the greatest array of recording artists ever assembled under one label, I can merely return the record, pay a small handling and postage cost, which I feel is most nominal, etc . . . "

So what happens if I don't agree that it is the most exciting offer I've ever heard of, but would merely like to buy a record or two? Why do I have to give the company a sworn testi-monial and agree that the handling charges are nominal when I think they happen to be exorbitant, even though I'm willing to pay for

I call it brain-washing when you are coerced into affixing your signature to a coupon which has you go on record as agreeing that the albums "Toby Wing Sings" and "Borah Minevitch Plays Beethoven" should be part of everybody's collection.

By the time anyone finishes reading the lengthy advertising copy, it isn't surprising that they agree to all sorts of things. Such as the time I entered a contest which required sending in a coupon, stating whether you did or didn't want a World Atlas. The company could not conceive of anyone hoping to win a contest by not agreeing to buy the Atlas and subsequently it arrived in the mail, along with ensuing due bills from collection agencies and attorneys when I refused to pay for it.

But these are only typical of most busine reply coupons, which would also like you to con-

"Yes, I feel that my children are culturally deprived in not owning your 25-volume set of encyclopedia. I would like to raise their educutional standards at a cost of no more than \$14.99 per month. So without further delay, although with no cost and no obligation, have a salesman call on me."

If I were editing the replies I would like to answer them this way: "Buster, you may have a prospect for your (health club, investment properties, insurance, book-of-the-month club) offer but just send me the plain facts. And if you have one of your salesmen call, please have him tell me at the door he is "selling something," instead of trying to convince me he isn't.

"Better yet, I'll call you. Don't call me." In the latter instance I'm thinking of the salesman who showed up in person to present me a free calendar I had sent in for. It cost me \$19.02 in semi-annual insurance premiums.




