IN OTHER action, the council last night: Agreed to contribute \$3,000 toward the development of a park in the Riviera Village area. The park, partially in Torrance and in Redondo Beach, will cost an estimated \$21,000. The city of Redondo Beach will put up \$8,000 and the remainder is to be contributed by the Riviera Village Association, the Riviera Rotary Club, the Hollywood

Riviera Sportsmen's Club, and the Riviera Homeowners' Association. Adopted, on first reading, an amendment to the city's Uniform Housing Code which severely restricts the right of an inspector to enter a home. The amendment is the result of a petition drive headed by a North Torrance group. Approved the deletion of

Oak Street between Carson Street and Jefferson Street from the city's master plan of streets. Received copies of a new Civil Service Ordinance which the council's Finance Committee has recommended for adoption and set Aug. 8 at 7 p.m. for a public hearing on the ordinance. Named Ken Miller mayor pro tem for the six-month period beginning May 15.
