

# High Car Insurance Rates Going Higher

A combination of causes—more cars, more accidents, higher repair bills, larger awards in negligence cases—has skyrocketed the price of car insurance. And—hold on to your bucket seats—rates will go still higher.

But you can save unnecessary expense in buying auto insurance wisely. Here are some tips from the experts, overlooked by many people.

You can save up to 40 percent on collision insurance which covers damage to your car—by raising the deductible to \$100 instead of the usual \$50. While it makes sense to have this type of insurance on a new car, experts advise dropping it after the car ages. Their reasoning: the more your car depreciates, the less you can collect in trade-in value. A couple of annual collision premiums can equal this amount.

Check all your insurance policies carefully and eliminate duplicate coverage, especially medical payments. All companies do not charge the same rates, so shop carefully. Before jumping at any lower-priced insurance, however, consider the quality of coverage and claims service.

MOST AMERICANS walking about 1,000 miles a year, taking more than 1 1/2 million steps in the process. That means the materials used for shoes must be thoroughly tested to provide wear as well as good comfort qualities.

A prime example is the extensive testing undergone by the new man-made shoe introduced by the B. F. Goodrich Co. The leather-like polymeric material has been warmly received by many leading shoe makers, four of which—Jarnan Division of Genesco, Winthrop Division of International, Freeman and Weysenberg—have announced plans to market men's Aztran shoes this fall.

The company estimates the domestic market for polymeric shoe upper materials will reach \$125 million by 1970 and \$225 million by 1975. B. F. Goodrich will build a major manufacturing plant in Ohio, scheduled for full operation by mid-1968, for its polymeric "uppers."

AN AUTOMATIC car wash advertised it will wash motorcycles, "including the drivers," for \$1.50. Resort hotels near the sunken tanker Torrey Canyon may require guests to go barefooted to keep oil off the carpeting. Gerbils, small rodents of Old World origin, are replacing hamsters in many American homes because they drink less water and their cages, dealers say, require little cleaning. Compulsive consumers are being treated successfully with an experimental drug called haloperidol.

CLEANING AND maintaining offices, schools, factories and other commercial and public buildings has become a big business and a leading source of jobs, according to an authority in the field.

The Service Products Division of S. C. Johnson and Son, Inc. reports that American businesses and institutions spend an estimated \$15 billion annually to keep their buildings clean and polished.

Of this amount, the Division says, about 90 to 95 percent goes for manpower and only the small remaining percentage for equipment and supplies. It added that the modern building custodian is "a trained specialist who does the work of several men by using (1) automatic equipment, (2) products resulting from the latest chemical technology and (3) a systematic approach to his job."

CITED BY the Division as an example of the most advanced polymer chemistry applied to the field is the new "Permacare" system of floor care, developed by Johnson Wax researchers. Its use involves four "chemically matched" products to seal, finish, maintain and, when necessary, remove the finish at a substantial savings in man-hours, the Division said.

"Resilient flooring—even though muddied up, subjected to spills of liquids or otherwise dirtied—can be restored repeatedly to a glossy, protected condition with a simple washing, thanks to the locking-out of water by a metal complex in the sealer and finish," the report said.

# Oceanography Report Issued

The ocean, long rich in lore that includes sunken treasure ships and the legendary lost continent of Atlantis, offers something more tangible to those who would reap its watery harvest—a market of immense potential.

That market and marine activity in general are examined in a new Bank of America report entitled "Oceanography—The Challenge and the Opportunity."

Oceanography study points out: "Potentially, the ocean market could amount to hundreds of billions of dollars annually... developing ocean resources can be profitable and much of it will be done by business."
