YMCA Paper Has Annual Camp Lists

A new local newspaper hit the streets this week through-out Torrance, Lomita and Hollywood Riviera with a one-issue circulation of over 50,000.

Published annually by the Torrance Family YMCA, the special newspaper describes the world's largest YMCA Summer Camping program for boys, girls, teens, and family groups.

According to Leo Radford, YMCA camp committee chairman, this summer more than 4,000 youngsters will visit thirty sessions of "Y" Camp with local directors and counselors.

The newspaper, published by the YMCA Camp Commit-

tee, provides details about all of the camps from "stay-at-home" Fun Clubs for boys and girls in the second and third grades through resident camps for youngsters 9 to 12, a wealth of adventures for teenagers including caravans, pack trips, rubber expeditions and High Sierra Base Camps, and a number of YMCA Family Camps in attractive wilderness locations.

A NEW family camp has been arranged at Aspen Hollow near Hume Lake in the Sequoia Kings Canyon National Park. Limited to 25 lucky families, this campsite will be the scene of swimming, fishing, pinocle, sack races, picnics, hikes, trips to a cave, boating, campfires and fuzzwart hunts. Arthur and Pat Sears will direct this new family offering from July 29 to Aug. 5.

COMMENCING the moment school vacation starts, the Torrance Family YMCA has at least one camp going every minute of the summer, and on many weeks operates as many as five camps simultaneously.

Four new experiences are offered for the first time this Summer: Camp Paul Bunyan for boys 9 to 12 will be held at ever-popular Round Meadow from June 24 to July 1, and has been scheduled especially for kids new to the area who may have missed signing up for eight glorious days in Round Meadow. Featuring an Olympic size swimming pool, a craft lodge, a large game meadow, hiking trails, archery and riflery ranges, and roaring campfires each night, Paul Bunyan is a boyhood dream come true.

After many years of concentrating on mountain camps exclusively, the Torrance Family YMCA is launching a Summer Fun Club, from July 31 until Aug. 25, for boys and girls 6½ through 8. The program is one of camping fun conducted in and around the YMCA each day, and with

special trips and campfires each week. Hugh Tower, a product of the local YMCA, returns from the Republic of China in order to direct this YMCA program.

The longest Torrance Family YMCA Caravan in history comes this summer when Mary Lou and Joe Wilcox take 20 high school and college students 32,000 miles throughout the Orient in a traditional exchange program with the Nagoya, Japan YMCA. The trip extends from July 10 until August 26, and includes Hawaii, the Philippines, Singapore, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Bangkok, Japan, and Alaska.

IN ADDITION to the many camps offered, the newspaper also describes the YMCA's unique Summer Reading Program directed by Robert Metcalf for boys and girls in the second grade and up from June 26 until July 28.

The program provides help in reading skills for youngsters who would like to improve in this area. Free testing is now under way at the YMCA.

The dividend, paid April 30 to shareholders of record April 20, was the 52nd consecutive dividend authorized by the firm.

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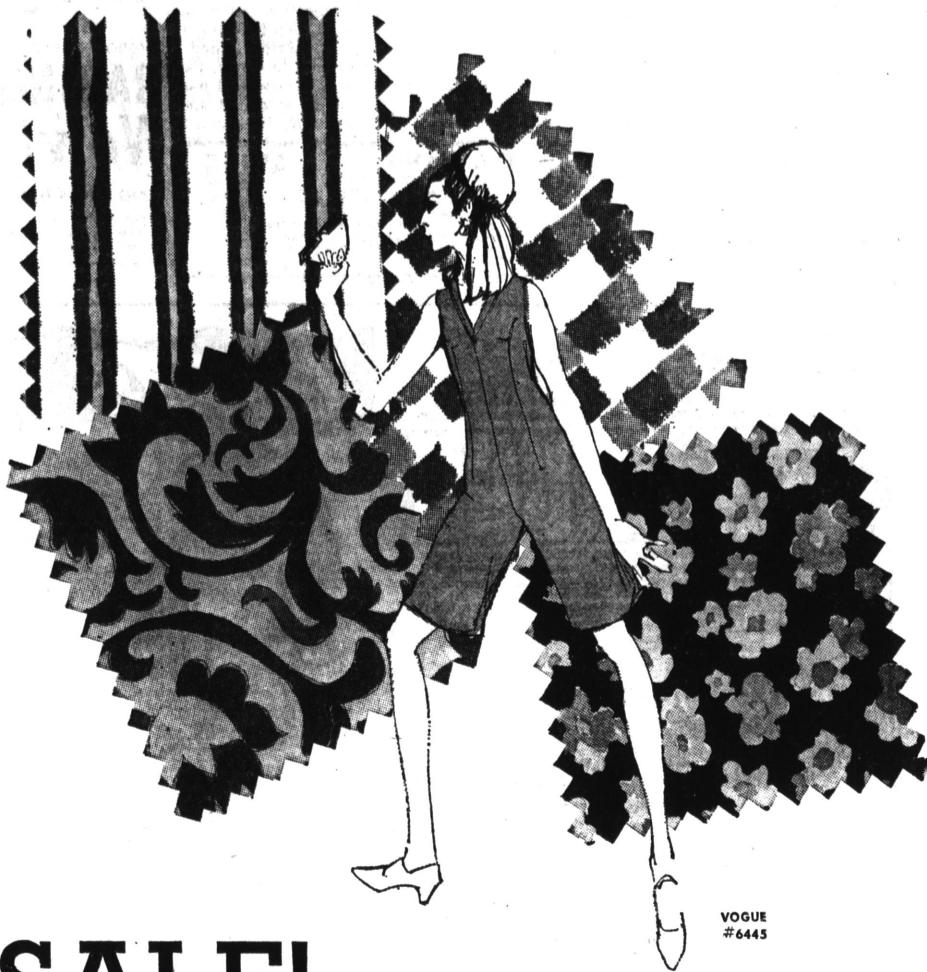
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
