Peninsula Volunteers of Needlework Guild

To Tour Retarded Children's Foundation

Peninsula Volunteers Needlework Guild will accept the invitation of Mrs. Evelyn Rorabough, director of the Harbor Area Retarded Children's Foundation, tomorrow morning to become acquainted with the work of her school. They will hold their spring meeting at the facility at 2520 Signal Street in San Pedro, and will be taken on a tour of the various classrooms, work rooms and playgrounds.

The Peninsula Volunteers are especially interested in the foundation because it is the agency most recently added of the 13 they now help support. The Volun-

teers supply the Foundation with wash cloths, towels, bedding for the cots on which the youngest children take naps, dish towels, muumus and children's underwear.

The morning meeting will begin at 10 with a social period for which refreshments will be provided by the Rolling Hills Riviera section under the direction of Mrs. Roger Taylor. A short business meeting will follow at which the Volunteers' president will call for progress reports from the various section presidents.

Before beginning the tour,

Mrs. Rorabough will tell something of the history of the Foundation, which had its inception in 1952 when a group of parents of retarded children organized a school offering half day sessions at the Homer Toberman Settlement house, a location it soon outgrew. At the Signal Street location classes are held from 9:30 to 2:30 Monday through Friday during the September to June school year.

Mrs. Rorabough will discuss the present scope of activities which include academic instruction, arts and crafts, socialization, and a sheltered workshop begun

two years ago where older students working at seven large floor looms produce beautiful pieces of the weavers art.

Since the school as yet receives no federal, state, or local school district financial aid, it must depend on donations from individuals and service and civic organizations plus funds raised at three major events during the year.

Mrs. Rorabough will tell of plans on the drawing board for a new and much roomier and better equipped school to be begun in the near future on a site already obtained.
