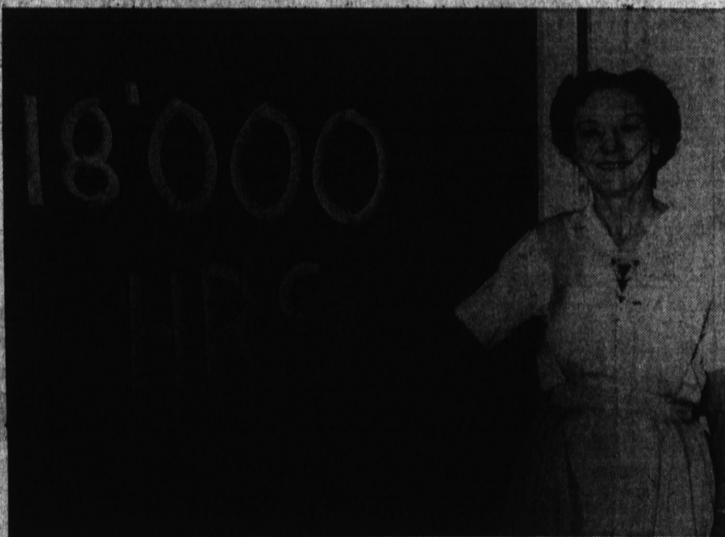
Mrs. Thomas Gwin, District XV-S President of Zeta Tau Alpha, will be the Chapter's distinguished guest and installing officer.
