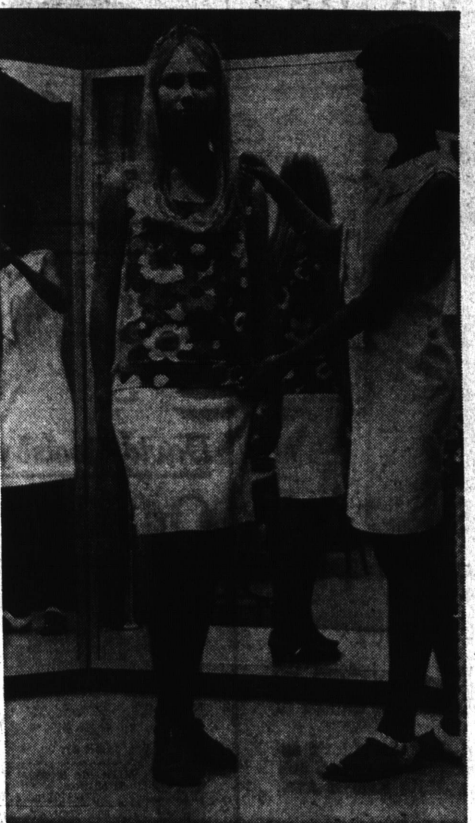
Miss Moore, a graduate of Narbonne High school in Harbor City, will succeed Miss Cheryl Petersen.
