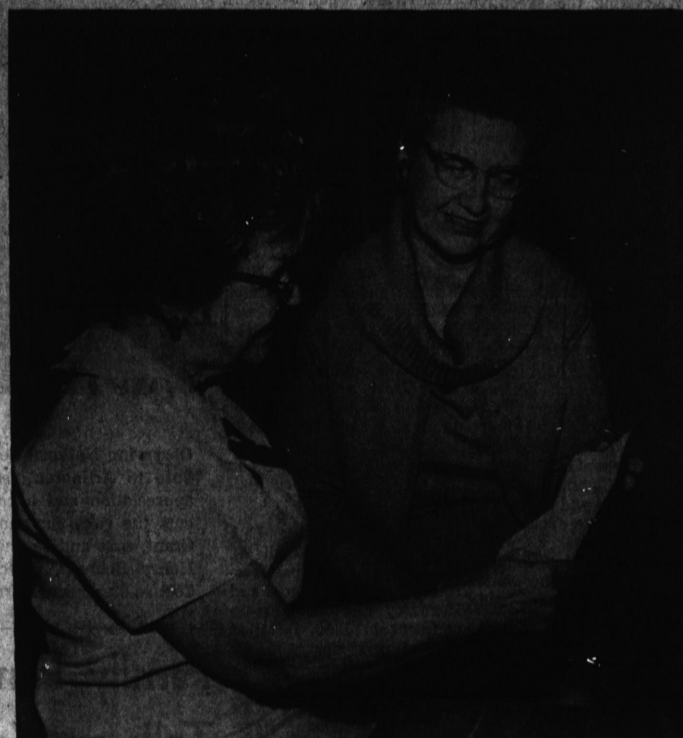
The evening will begin with a social hour at 7 p.m., followed by dinner at 8 p.m.

Mrs. Warren E. Putnam (Mary A.), who has served as principal at Halldale School since 1964, when she replaced Mrs. Amanda Wilhelm, will retire July 1, completing 41 years of teaching in the Los Angeles county schools.

Mrs. Putnam, a native Californian, received all her education in California schools. Her grade school days were spent in San Luis Obispo County; she graduated from Paso Robles High School, and received her teaching credentials from the University of California at Los Angeles. She continued her studies at UCLA and received her BA degree in education in 1936.

While attending UCLA she was a member of Pi Lambda Theta, honorary scholarship society for women, and the Delta Kappa Gamma, honorary leadership organization for women. Mrs. Putnam is also an honorary member

of the Optimist Club and holds an Honorary Life Membership in the Parent-Teacher Association.

Mr. and Mrs. Putnam have three children and six grandchildren. They make their home near Seal Beach.

Last year, the couple was on the staff of the Seven Seas program, floating campus of Chapman College in Orange. Mrs. Putnam was named dean of students and Mr. Putnam, assistant to the executive officer for the round-the-world cruise.

The couple has traveled extensively, visiting all continents except South America, which they plan to tour upon retirement.

The Halldale principal came to the school from teaching duties at the Figueroa Street School.

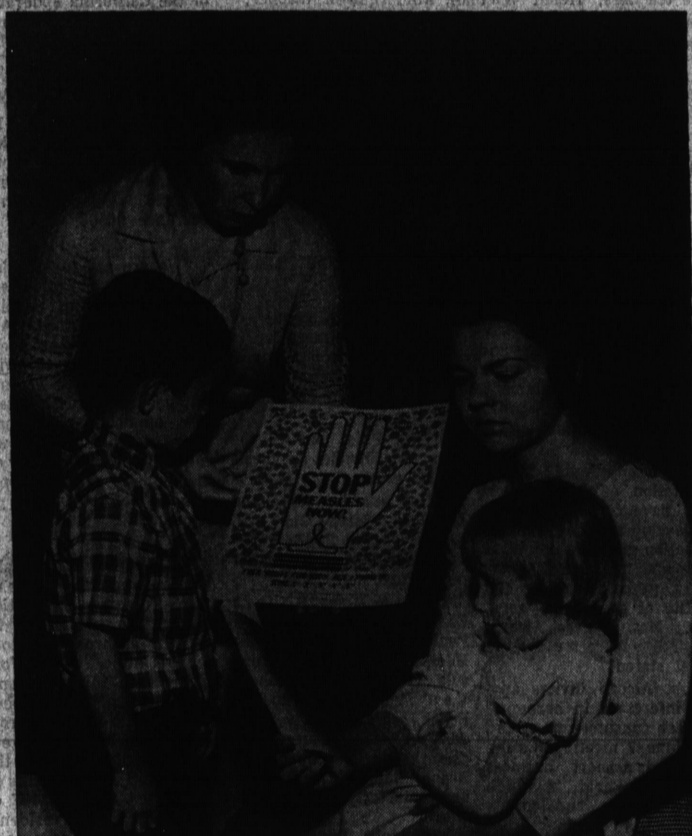

The picnic activities will begin at 10:30 this morning with the lunch at 1 p.m. Games, conversation and relaxation make up the informal agenda.

On hand will be all of the American Field Service students now attending Torrance high schools and their families. They are Elizabeth McClery of Scotland, who has been a member of the Jenchs family at North High since September; Leo de Bever from Helmond, the Netherlands, and his American family, the Elliots, South High; Daniel Darre, Torrance High, living with the Belser family but soon returning to La Plata, Argentina; Selda Ustertunali, Turkish daughter of the Erving family of West High; and Gleda Hey, who hails from New Zealand, but now is big sister to the Dock family of South High area. Also in attendance will be the Newcomer family of West High whose daughter, Robin, will be an American

Abroad this summer to Italy.

American Field Service is an organization with chapters in 60 countries and headquarters in New York. The program, which aims to promote international understanding on a people-to-people basis, involves 16-18 year old high school students and their families. Foreign teenagers who wish to come to America and experience a year here, living as a member of an American family and an American high school senior, apply in their home countries. American high school juniors and seniors apply here, through their schools, to go abroad.

The local chapter is made up of families who are interested in the program, whether or not they have directly participated by hosting students. However, any family interested in hosting a student or applying to send their son or daughter as an American Abroad should join the local chapter and prepare themselves for the experience. Family membership is only \$5 per year, \$10 is a patron membership; and \$25 or more is (Continued on Page B-2)
