On his 21st birthday in 1918, her son, William, purchased the home at 1521 Cota from Jared Torrance, founder of this city. Four years ago, William married his sweetheart of the 1920s, and the house on Cota is home to the threesome. Mr. Sykes worked for Columbia Steel for 42 years, and is now retired.


