

Turbine Car On Display

Parnelli Jones' exciting turbine-powered racing car is on display at the Parnelli Jones Firestone Store and Auto Service Center, 20550 Hawthorne Blvd. through Tuesday.

The public is invited to stop at the store between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m. for a chat with Jones and a look at the revolutionary racing machine.

The visit in Torrance is one of many scheduled across the nation for Jones and his No. 40 STP-Paxton Turbine car.

Jones, 33, one of the world's most famous drivers, set a number of records while driving the car in the 51st running of the Indianapolis "500" May 30-31.

He led with apparent ease during 171 of the 200 laps, and was conceded victory by many fellow competitors and the crowd before mechanical troubles forced him out of the race with 7 1/2 miles to go. Officially, he finished sixth.

Showing of the car with the turbine engine amazed many racing buffs. There were predictions its brakes would fail. Others said there would be gear box troubles.

Following a post-race autopsy, builder Andy Granatelli announced a bearing costing \$6 forced the \$300,000 machine out of the competition.

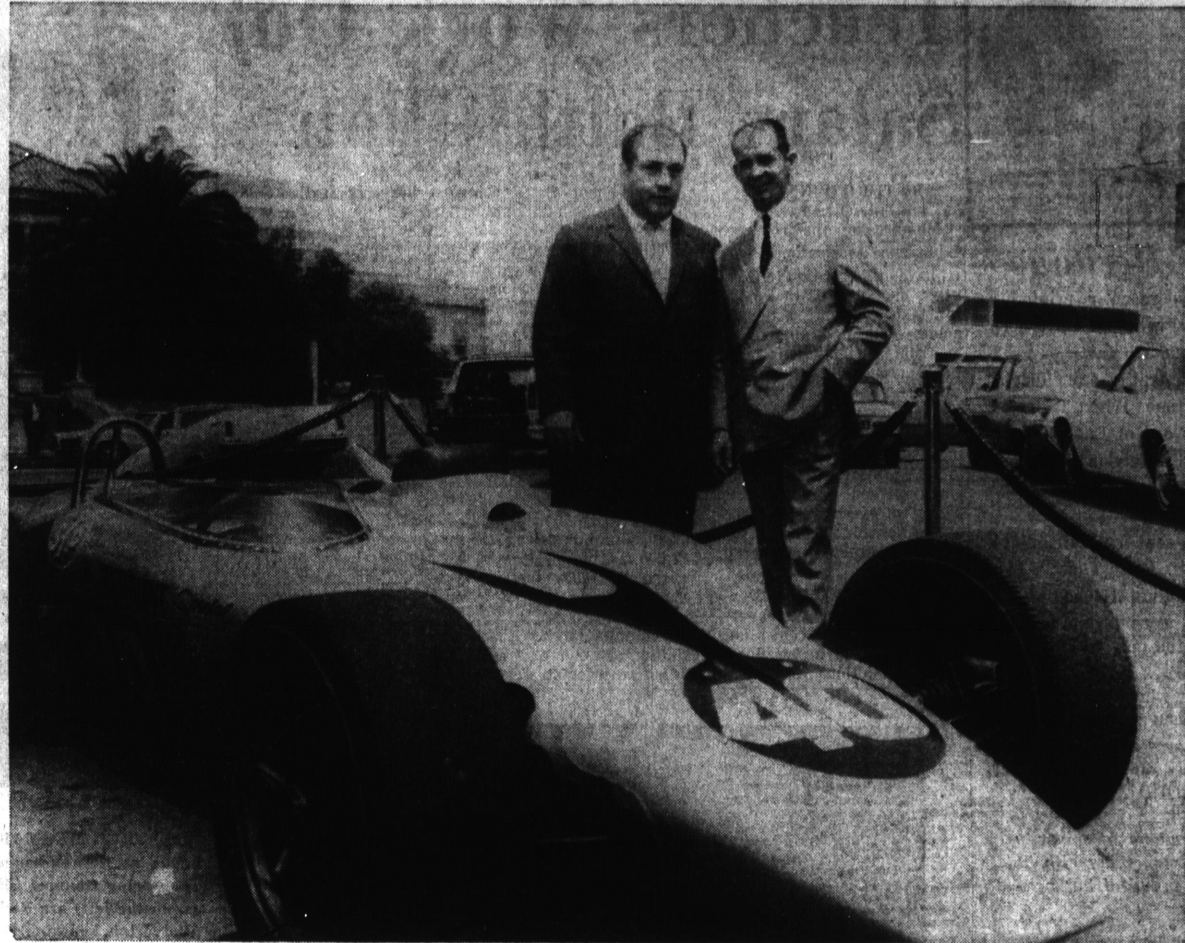
The car has many unique features. Principally, the power plant is different from that in any car that ever competed at the famous 2 1/2-mile Indianapolis track.

The Pratt & Whitney turbine engine gets twice the mileage from its kerosene as piston engines get from their fuel. The engine is expected to give 3,000 hours of operating service before it is in need of overhauling.

It is quiet running, emitting a nearly inaudible whine as it zips around the track. The engine is mounted on the left side of the center section of the car, while the driver sits to the right of the engine. All other cars in the 1967 "500" were rear-engine.

The turbocar is a four-wheel drive vehicle. It is equipped with four "rear" tires because each wheel is a drive wheel. The tires are 12.10-16 Firestone Indy tires, the same as those which equipped the rear of many of the other cars at Indianapolis. The rear-engine cars use 10.10-16 (and, in some cases 15-inch) tires on the front.

Jones drove the Indy race on a single set of Firestone Indy tires. Engineers of The Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. who checked the tires following the race said the tires had adequate tread remaining for another 500-mile run around the gruelling race course.

Bryant Clinic Speaker

Through the nation he's simply called "Bear."

Throughout the nation he's simply called "Bear."

His job is winning football games and there are none better at his trade.

"Bear," alias Paul W. Bryant, is to be the featured speaker at the seventh annual Pepperdine College coaching clinic next week.

Bryant, slated to make his presentation on Tuesday, will talk on his favorite subject—winning.

Specifically, the "Bear" will speak on the "little things that win football games."

Already a legend in his time, Bryant is generally regarded as the top collegiate football coach in the country. His record backs this premise.

Two of the last three years his University of Alabama teams have won the national championship.

Many sportswriters felt his squad deserved the honor last year, too, because it was the only major unbeaten and untied team in the land.

Over a career, which also includes stops at Maryland, Kentucky, and Texas A&M, Bryant has compiled an enviable 170-51-14 record.

During this tenure he has developed numerous All-Americans including Joe Namath, Ray Perkins, Lee Roy Jordan, Billy Neighbors, and John David Crow.

Joining Bryant on the program will be another Southern genius, Vince Dooley of Georgia.

Twice in the last three years, Dooley's Bulldogs have won for him the Southeastern Conference "Coach of the Year" award.

Last fall his club finished with a 10-1 record and was right behind Notre Dame, Michigan State, and Alabama in the national ratings.

Perhaps the biggest win in Dooley's career was a stunning upset over Bryant's Crimson Tide in 1965. That game was the last blemish on Alabama's record.

Assisting Bryant will be two of his highly regarded aides, Sam Bailey and Richard Williamson.

Swim Meet To Be In Los Angeles in July

The dates for the biggest swim meet in the West, the 9th Annual Los Angeles Invitational Swimming Championships, have been set for July 28, 29, and 30 at the Los Angeles Swim Stadium.

Invited to compete are top swimmers from 11 western states and foreign stars, including world and American record holders and Olympic champions.

It is the last opportunity for swimmers to qualify for the national championships to be held in Oak Park, Ill., for men, and Philadelphia, Pa., for women. It is at these nationals U.S. teams will be chosen for the World Student Games in Tokyo, European Championships, and the 1967 Little Olympics in Mexico City.

The Invitational should produce top performance with the usual number of world records. Gary points out it is a well known fact more world records have been broken at this classic than any other except the Olympics and the Nationals.

The championships are sponsored by the SPAAU Swim Committee in cooperation with the Los Angeles City Recreation and Parks Department. It is sanctioned by the Southern Pacific AAU. Competition runs three days, and each day has a complete schedule of events. Preliminaries are at 9:30 a.m., finals at 3:30 p.m.

The Friday, July 28, order of events for men and women will be: 400m. freestyle, 200m. breaststroke, 200m. butterfly, 100m. backstroke and 800m. freestyle relay. Saturday's July 29, schedule will be televised live on KTTV and is as follows: 100m. butterfly, 100m. breaststroke, 200m. freestyle, 400m. individual medley and 400m. freestyle relay. The Sunday schedule is: 200m. backstroke, 100m. freestyle, 1500m. freestyle, 20m. individual medley and 400m. medley relay.

All-City Honors Go To Klein

Venice High School placed three players on the All-Los Angeles City Baseball Team from its city championship nine, including Larry Klein, unanimous player of the year selection.

Klein is the first player from Venice High School to be accorded player of the year honors since the inception of the Helms Board in 1938.

This was the first city title for Venice High School in baseball. Coach Bob Duron's Gondoliers swept through playoff action as pitcher Klein, 6-2, 185-pound mound star, compiled a 7-1 league record and helped his Venice teammates to four straight wins in the playoffs—1-0 over Carson, 5-0 over Huntington Park, 1-0 over Canoga Park and 4-1 over Westchester.

Coach Joe Gonzales' Westchester Comets beat Venice twice during the league season and although both finished with identical 9-3 records, the Comets got the nod as the league title-winning team off their double win over the Gondoliers.

Other Venice High players to be named to the first team are outfielder Dave Coyne and catcher Brad Alexander. Runner-up Westchester placed two men on the first all-city nine . . . first baseman Terry Howarth and pitcher John Grant.

KENDALL SIGNED BY CINCINNATI

Fred Kendall, three-year varsity catcher for Torrance High School, has signed a baseball contract with the Cincinnati Reds of the National League and has been assigned to the Sioux Falls, South Dakota, team.

Fred, 18, took part in the Reds' pregame workout at Dodger Stadium last Saturday before leaving for Sioux Falls.

Fred's stepfather, Robert E. Adams, said the young ballplayer received a real good contract. He also said young Kendall planned to continue his education.

Kendall has lived in Torrance all his life. His home is 1737 Date Ave., Torrance.

Granatelli May Enter Mays Race

The controversial STP Paxton Turbocar will be entered in either the upcoming Rex Mays 300 at Riverside International Raceway Nov. 26 or the Phoenix, Ariz., championship race if the car is cleared for further competition by U. S. Auto Club action Monday.

That announcement by Anthony (Andy) Granatelli, president of the STP Division of Studebaker Corporation, was greeted with applause at a press conference Thursday in Los Angeles.

Both Granatelli, whose company built the turbine-powered racing car at its Paxton shops in Santa Monica, and Parnelli Jones, who drove the car to a heartbreak finish just 7 1/2 miles short of the checkered flag at Indianapolis, were present with the car to discuss the vehicle in detail.

Granatelli praised Jones as a major factor in the car's performance. Granatelli and Jones agreed that the tractive advantages of four-wheel drive, coupled with an air-craft-designed chassis, provided as much performance to the car as did the radical turbine power source.

"Two things the turbine gives us which are of great advantage are tremendous smoothness of power, plus absolute dependability," Granatelli said.

Jones pointed out that the torque converter action of the turbine, which resembles the features offered by an automatic transmission is a passenger car, were another big contribution.

At one point, Granatelli scoffed at the alleged high horsepower of the turbine: "I told USAC (U. S. Auto Club) that I thought so little of the horsepower provided by the turbine that I would put a Chevrolet Six into the Turbocar in place of the turbine and take it to Langhorne, Pa., and blow off the Indy cars."

He explained that Langhorne is a short track where horsepower is not as important as it is at Indianapolis, and the race is often won with sheer cornering power.

Hollywood Park To Run Vanity

Championship of the western filly and mare division will be decided Saturday when Hollywood Park presents the 26th running of the \$50,000 added Vanity Handicap at a mile and one-eighth.

The West Coast's finest thoroughbred performers of the equine fair sex will go postward in the Vanity Handicap, which has been won by many of America's greatest fillies and mares since its inaugural in 1940.

This year's renewal will feature a rematch between Mrs. Vanderbilt Adams' versatile Desert Trial and George F. Getty II's classy Natashka. They fought it out recently in the \$27,700 Milady Handicap with Desert Trial defeating Natashka, the even money choice, by two and one-half lengths while conceding her weight, 125 to 123 pounds.

Earlier this season Desert Trial, a Florida-bred daughter of Moslem Chief trained by Carl Roles, won the second division of the Hollywood Ladies Handicap on the turf.

Natashka, who was a leading contender for national honors among three-year-old fillies in 1966, was a two-time stakes winner last winter at Santa Anita, garnering the Las Flores and Santa Maria Handicaps.

Other probable Vanity Handicap entrants include Hemcinto and Billrick Stables' stretch-running April Dawn, victress in the opening division of the Hollywood Ladies Handicap and third in the Milady 'Cap.
