

# \$1.2 Billion Spending Program Wins Approval

County Supervisors approved a \$1.26 billion budget Thursday, but it was done after \$17.5 million in budget cuts partly responsible due to fourth district Supervisor Burton Chace's efforts.

During a series of hearings and work sessions, Supervisor Chace led opposition to a subsidy to the Rapid Transit District totaling \$2.5 million.

Stating that "such subsidies place more of a load on the already overburdened taxpayer," Chace felt that a subsidy of this kind would be double taxation on districts that have their own transit lines, including Torrance.

"The county doesn't subsidize municipal districts—why should it do so for the Rapid Transit District," Chace argued.

CHACE SAID he did not agree with some of the budget inclusions, but voted for

in which Chace stood alone during deliberations, was his opinion on the sale of county land in downtown Los Angeles to private concerns. During hearings, Chace was outvoted 4-1 by supervisors on the question of selling the land to help balance the county budget.

STATING, "It doesn't make good sense to sell the land at this time to balance the budget," Chace said he felt

that the sale may not be used for balancing due to the time of sale. One other economy move by Chace came when he instigated a drive to cut county employees to hold the line on personnel costs for 1967-68. The across-the-board cutback, in 58 county departments, cut approximately \$1 million off the new budget.
