## Land Values Jump; Tax Bills to Follow

By JERRY REYNOLDS Press-Meraid City Editor An increase of nearly 25 per cent — the largest in the city's history — in the assessed valuation of Tor-rance was announced Monday by County Assessor Philip E. Watson. Watson, in a report on the county's assessed valuation.

county's assessed valuation, said the value of land, per-sonal property, and improve-ments in the city jumped from \$297 million in 1967 to \$366,187,370, exclusive of public utilities.

Addition of approximately \$21 million in public utilities

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would bring the city's worth to more than \$387 million. The increase is nearly twice that estimated by Watson's office in May when, under state law, he had to provide school districts with estimates for budget planning.

ning. Both the city and the Tor-rance school budgets have been based on assessed valu-ation of about \$340 million, the Press-Herald was told. First question asked by local officials of Assessor Watson has been, "Are you sure?" sure?"

sistant city manager, told the Press-Herald yesterday the city has been making every effort to double check the figures. "We want to make sure there was no mistake made," Scharfman said. And if the figure is cor-rect — Scharfman said there is no reason now to believe

Dr. Frank Mattox, assistant superintendent of schools for business, said yesterday he has asked Assessor Watson to "double check" the figures. Mattox said the increase is more than twice that of any previous year and because it is "so abnormal we want to protect ourselves."

Assessed valuation of the school district is pegged at \$365,656,510 or about \$500,-000 less than the valuation

of the city, Watson reported. The reason is that boundaries of the school district have not been adjusted to include some sections adjoining Lo-mita which were annexed by the city in recent years.

The sections are largely unpopulated and there has been no pressing need to in-corporate the areas into the school district it was reported.


