At Empty Saddle Club

Las Amigas de Las Lomas, Rolling Hills Auxiliary to the Crippled Children's Guild of Orthopaedic Hospital, will sponsor its tenth annual National Junior and Quarter Horse Show on Saturday and Sunday, July 29 and 30. The event will be held at the Empty Saddle Club, 3257 Empty Saddle Rd., Rolling Hills.

Show time both days is 8 a.m. There is no charge and the show is open to the public. Refreshments will be available.

Equestrians participating in the show are 18 years and under. They come from California, Arizona and Nevada.

This National Show has been licensed and approved for points by the American Horse Shows Association, "C" points; Pacific Coast Hunter, Jumper and Stock Horse Association; and Junior "B" American Quarter Horse Association.

Judging will be Miss Celia Thorsen, Los Olivos; Sandy Sanders, Tarzana; Ronnie Richards, Valley Center; Elson B. Foster, Covina; Steward is Richard Glascock of Palos Verdes Estates.

This is Las Amigas' one fund-raising event of the year. From their first television set in 1957, the group has increased its donation through the Horse Show approximately \$300 per year. The donation from the 1966 show was \$4,818.79. In nine years, this is a total of \$25,000, the cumulative effort of not more than 25 women.

Proceeds from entry fees, and sale of program advertising go to the Orthopaedic Hospital.

Couples Club to Stage Aloha Party Saturday



However, her "day" was Wednesday in Harbor General Hospital's auditorium from 1 to 4 p.m. There, members of all the Volunteer groups serving the hospital, many of its employees, and representatives of organizations from surrounding communities she has enlisted as "friends of Harbor General," wished her happiness in retirement with gifts and congratulations. "Mrs. Mac", as she is affectionately called, is Marguerite Broen McAllister, Harbor's Chief of Patient Services such as the Auxiliary, Volunteers for Children, her beloved Candy Strippers, and the Gray Ladies, all of whom she has directed since 1955.

There are two moments "Mrs. Mac" will treasure as the years roll by in retirement and reflection. One,
