By boat, the travelers made an all-day trip down the Amazon to the border of Ecuador and Peru, where Mr. Jesson owns a 12,500 acre island which he has named "Jessonia."

Mrs. Seward, a striking blonde, was the first white woman to set foot on the island. The Peruvian Indians were fascinated at seeing the "fair lady", who won their admiration and affection when she distributed chocolate candy bars to them. Mrs. Seward had been told to take plenty of candy bars, honey, and peanut butter, delicacies which the Indians seldom get. As a result of her gifts and kindnesses, the Sewards were showered with souvenir gifts from the Indians.

On the return trip, they spent several days in Iquitos and Lima before boarding the plane for California.


