### Little League Tournament

Fre-Way Little League, the home team, and Torrance Central Little League meet in the first game of District 27 tournament play at 5:30 today. Pacific Coast will oppose Lomita at Fre-Way tomorrow, followed by Torrance National and Harbor City on Friday.

The tournament is under the direction of Red Mochan, district administrator.

One game is also set for Saturday between Dominguez and Victoria Park.

Games will be played both at Fre-Way and North Torrance West Dominguez Field on Monday and Tuesday in the second round.

Monday's game at West pits the home team against North Torrance East and Tuesday's game is between Carson and Torrance American.

District 26 playoffs got under way Monday with North Redondo blanking Malaga Cove, 5-0. Russ Murray hit a three-run homer in the first inning for the win.

### Cycles To Race 50 Laps

One of the most important motorcycle races in the nation this year — the 50-lap U.S. Steeplechase Championship — will be held at Ascot Park Saturday evening.

Qualifying and novice racing are set for Friday.

Managing Director J. C. Agajian reports a king-sized entry list of 56 experts and 48 amateurs for the \$6,700 race. The lineup includes virtually all the big names of the two-wheeled racing world.

Eddie Mulder, Burbank, Triumph-mounted, is the defending champion. Eddie won all the U.S. steeplechase championship races in 1966, scoring an unprecedented sweep.

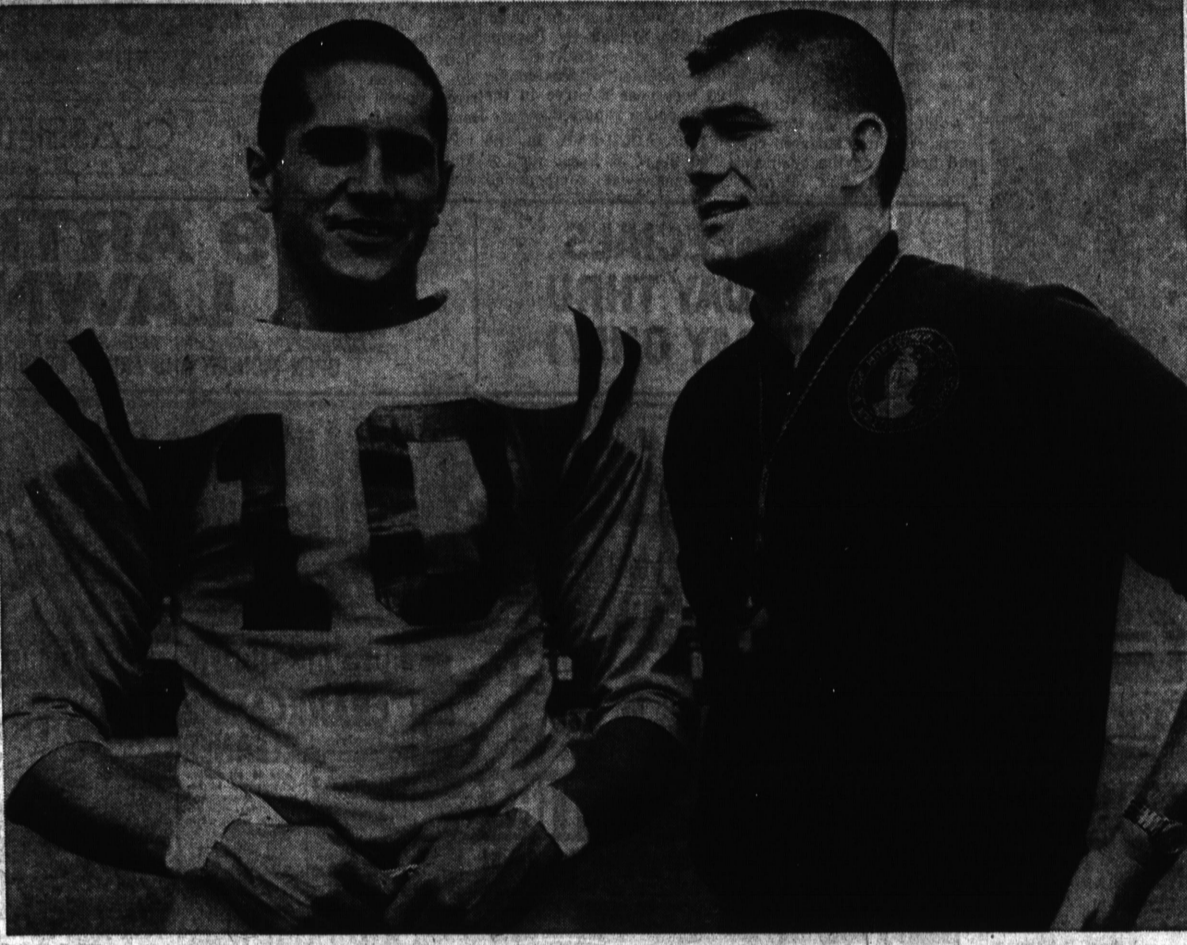
Bart Markel, three-time U.S. motorcycle racing king and the current champion, will be among those on hand. Markel, who hails from Flint, Mich., will ride a Harley.

Dick Mann, who carries the Number Two national tag, will be present. He will ride a BSA.

Gary Nixon, Baltimore, who is making a strong bid for the 1967 championship, has signed to ride a Triumph.

Another local favorite — Skip Van Leeuwen of Hollywood — is given a strong chance. Van Leeuwen is a special favorite on the five-eighths mile course at 183rd and Vermont Avenue.

Bolstered by a superb passing attack, the South is a 13-point favorite to beat the North in the first Catholic Big Brothers football game at Long Beach Veterans' Stadium Thursday night. Game time is 8 p.m.

Graham is backed by Mater Dei's Jack Wigmore and Larry Diel of Pius X. They will alternate on offense and defensive safety.

Ed Gilles, the hard running back from Montgomery, will be at fullback on offense. Bruce Rollinson of Mater Dei and Jim Nash of Mt. Carmel are the remaining backs.

Starting at offensive guard for Montgomery is Charlie Reade and at defensive end is John Sullivan of the Knights.

Larry Butler, a tackle from St. John Bosco, and Mike Ponczocha of Pius X, an end on offense and tackle on defense, go both ways for the South.

Quarterback Diel, the most valuable player in the Catholic League last fall, has been placed at halfback by Coaches George Swade and Bob Woods. The way Diel is running at halfback he never should have fooled around at quarterback.

Even Ernie Booker, the Fermin Lasuen flash, has been beaten out of a first string backfield spot.

To delight the spectators in a game which required only 10 days of practice, a moratorium has been declared on red-dogging, stunting, and intricate defenses.

mit neck stretch. Push the ball back away from your seat and legs. This position opens the chest wide so that you may breathe more deeply.

**BENT KNEE SITUPS**  
This is the single best exercise for strengthening the abdominals, for flattening a "pot belly" and for improving the size and shape of the waist as well. Notice the sit-

ups are done with bent knees. This position makes it impossible for the seat muscles to help the abdominals pull you to a sitting position. Since they are attached to the pelvis in the back and the top of the thigh in front, strain in this area could give you a backache. But with the seat muscles "out of it" the abdominals get the workout without back strain.

Clasp the ball between your feet and lie down with knees bent and hands behind your head. Roll up to a sitting position with rounded back and then straighten. Roll down slowly with rounded

### Lakers Sign Anderson To Contract

Cliff Anderson, 1967 graduate from Philadelphia's St. Joseph College, has signed a contract with the Los Angeles Lakers for the 1967-68 season.

"Anderson might be exactly the man we have been looking for as a 'swing man,'" remarked Laker coach William von Breda Kolf.

"At 6'4", he is capable of playing either the forward or guard position, and is the defensive guard that every team is seeking," continued von Breda Kolf.

Among the numerous records set at St. Joseph College, Anderson was the first basketball contender to score 1,000 points prior to his senior year.

He scored 519 points during both his sophomore and junior years for an average of 17.9 per game both seasons. In his senior year, Cliff played 26 games, hit for 243 field goals out of 605 attempts, and dunked 204 free throws out of 279 tries.

For his collegiate career, Anderson had a total of 1,728 points for an average of 20.7 per game.
