A three-man board con-sidering a request for a pa-rade permit that would allow the Student Mobilization Committee to demonstrate in front of Dow Chemical Co. Aug. 6 has delayed a decision at least until tomorrow.

Granting the permit would necessitate the closing of one of the city's major north-south arterial highways— Crenshaw Boulevard — for a five-hour period. Dow Chemical Co. is located at 305 Crenshaw Blvd.

Spokesman for the Student Mobilization Committee Michael McCabe said the reason for choosing the chemical company as a target is their production of napalm for use in Vietnam. in Vietnam.

Grounds on which the board can deny the permit include seven provisions which cover the physical conwhich cover the physical con-duct of the demonstration. Accident Rate Decreases

Press-Herald Staff Writer Torrance's auto accident rate dropped 14 per cent for the first six months of 1967 as compared with the first six months in 1966, according to American Safety Council fig-

For the January to June period, 630 auto accidents oc-curred as compared for 732 for the first six months in 1966.

For the same period, there were three fatalities this year compared to six in the first half of 1966. Thursday, this year's total was increased with the death of William Bezan, 58, of 3721 W. 180th Place, after he was injured in an accident on Tuesday.

PART OF the total decrease, said traffic division officer Eugene Guest, is due to a police traffic program called Tactical Enforcement Detail which patrols areas of heavy traffic concentration for ve hicle violators.

Begun in March, the program puts more officers in the location of possible traffic violations and accidents during hours of peak traffic flow each day, he continued.

The two areas most heavily patrolled are the areas be-tween the San Diego Freeway and Carson Boulevard along the eastern side of the city and another area near the industrial section of Torrance, he explained.

A MAJOR traffic artery, A MAJOR traffic artery, Hawthorne Boulevard is the city's busiest highway and carries more vehicles each day than any other street in the county except the Harbor Freeway, Guest stated.

Although the injury rate is declining, according to police figures, the non-injury acci-dent rate climbed during the

first half of the year.

This can be explained, Officer Guest said, in understanding that the National Safety Council figures represent only auto accidents which are classified as "true acci-dents." They must qualify as a Safety Council accident through special criteria developed by the Council.

TORRANCE police, Guest said, count an accident if it is a driver reporting small dam age at the station or an actual police investigated auto col-lision. The Safety Council only counts the accidents only counts the accidents which are investigated by po-

On this basis, he said, the number of accidents has gone down over last year's figure.
