is necessary to be present in the subsoil during the entire period of their growth to accomplish satisfactory fruitage, but surface moisture in excess in this moist climate is likely to result in damaging cases of mildew unless preventatives and remedies are applied intelligently. Ample space should be allowed for their culture which should be deep and close up to the plants, as they root deeply and stand banking to advantage, as this places the roots deep down in the earth, giving them a cool moist location which is to their liking as they always prefer "cold feet." Water should be admitted into the subsoil in such a manner as to soak the subsoil without leaving the surface of the soil too wet.

Ridging and applying the water slowly assists in accomplishing this.

Cool, new soils rich in plant foods are adapted to their growth."

New land which is fresh and sweet is fine for the pea, but the land should be well subdued and in good mechanical condition and devoid of bermuda and other grasses. Oldstrawberry beds well prepared are fine for peas, as well as soil in which peas and beans have been grown and an alternation of beans and peas with applications of fertilizers or the plowing under of the vines or a green or cover crop is a good practice in preparation for peas.

Peas appropriate a great deal of atmospheric nitrogen during their growth in cool moist climates, and under proper culture there is little loss of moisture to trees and often their growth in orchards are a decided benefit if the crop is gathered green and the green vines plowed under.

Peas withstand severe frosts and may be planted early in February or as soon as excessive rains are past.

Peas withstand severe frosts and may be planted early in February or as soon as excessive rains are past. Deep plowing followed by fine pulverization of the soil surface is advisable. The planting may be done without ridging unless the weather is cold and wet at planting time.

At least one seed to every inch of the row should be used with the rows 15 to 18 inches apart for hand culture. The cowering should not be over one to one and a half inches in cool wet weather and two to two and one-half inches in warm dry weather is sufficient, as the seed is liable to rot before germination takes place if covered as deeply as most seeds of their size.

During their growth the soil should be worked to the plants until a ridge is formed and deep culture should be practiced as often as water is applied and as soon after watering as the condition of the soil will permit.
