5,000 BARREL WELL STRUCK

PROVES HERALD'S OFT-REPEATED. CLAIM THAT VALLEY IS UNDER-LAID WITH OIL AND FACTORIES MAY YET BE PUMPING OIU FROM THEIR OWN BACK YARDS.

THE TORRANCE OIL FIELD IS NO LONGER A WILDCAT PROPOSITION. IT IS PROVEN TERRI TORY, AT 12.45 THIS AFTERNOON THE WELL, KNOWN IN THIS CITY AS THE SANTA FE WELL, CAME IN, AND IT IS ESTIMATED, WILL HAVE A CAPACITY OF 3,000 TO 5,000 BARRELS PER DAY.

When oil spurted from the well which the Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil Corporation has been drilling on the old Del Amo ranch on the Torrance-Redondo boulevard two miles from town, there was much excitement on the streets and rumors and conjectures of all kinds were current. But even the wildest seem not to have exaggerated the truth, according to estimates of oil experts.

Oil men from many sections hurried to the well as soon as the rumor spread that oil had been found. ...It was reported that E. P. Ripley, Jr., of the Santa Fe Railroad, of which the oil corporation is said to be a subsidiary, as soon as he was informed of the strike, jumped into a machine and "burned up the road" to Torrance and the oil

The drillers struck the oil sand about two weeks ago and they immediately ceased operations to cement the well. ... They were working on the well, bailing off the water, when the oil came to the surface and rose a few feet above the floor of the derrick, too much of the water, tc., having been removed. The well was at once capped until the drillers resume operations. It will probably be neces-sery to drill deeper, and a new casing must be put in be-fore the well is ready for steady business.

The corporation began drilling last March. When the oil sand was struck about two weeks ago, the corporation leased a vast tract of 1021 acres of land in the neighborhood of the well from the Dominguez Land Corporation for a period of twenty years.

This great principality comprises all that area west or westerly of Cedar avenue on a line running south to Carson avenue, then to Plaza del Amo, southeast on Plaza del Amo to Arlington avenue, and south on Arlington avenue to Long Beach and Redondo road, with the exception of tracts that have been previously sold in Tracts 3757, 1952, 2761, 4070 and 2675, the westerly line being the western line of the Dominguez Land Corporation property

The terms of the lease provide that the drilling of the first well must commence within sixty days, with liberal provisions in favor of the leasor as to bonus, royalty, number of wells, tc.
