meeting Mr. Bartlett, was brought to me and introduced. I interviewed Mr. Stevenson, thought favorably of his plan and made a date with him to meet some of the business men to go over his plan in detail with them. In the meantime I had a talk with Mr. Proctor, who in his usual caution, believing that one ounce of preventative is worth ten pounds of cure, advised me to go slow and investigate, so when I met Mr. Stevenson by appointment, I put him off with excuses and I visited Redondo Beach, interviewing Mr. Webster of the Farmers and Merchants National Bank, President of their Chamber, and visited Hermosa Beach, interviewing Mr. Thatcher, of the First Bank of Hermosa Beach, and Mr. Mellinger, secretary of their Chamber of Commerce and instructed Mr. Bartlett to write the President of Covina Chamber of Commerce, and from all these sources, we received very encouraging reports. As a result I wrote Mr. Stevenson a letter and arranged for him to meet some of the business men and go over his plan in detail with the idea, if favorably impressed, of recommending it to a special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce the following Monday night.

"At that meeting Mr. Stevenson's plan was adopted and he was engaged and the excellent results of that engagement you will hear from Mr. Stevenson's own lips.

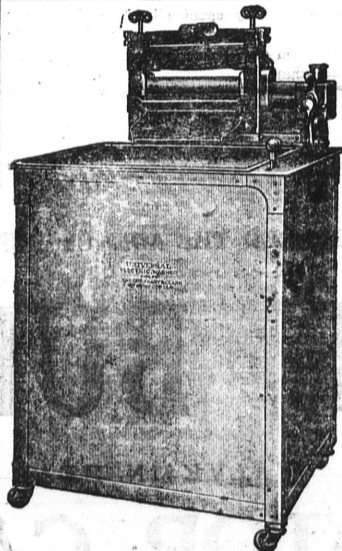
