A "LITCH" GATE

Out on Carson avenue the passerby will note a "litch" gate over the entrance to the enclosure or gateway leading to the home of Mr. W. T. Klusman which form of covered gateway is often seen in Europe as entrance ways to castle grounds and to monasteries. 






