

Frosts Are Due; Ready for

Garden beets may be grown in any good soil, but thrive best on rich, sandy loam. The seed can be sown

about the time the last frosts are due

and the young beets will be ready for use in 4 to 6 weeks.

Later plantings will give a succession and provide beets for winter storage. The seed should be sown in a drill with about 8 or 10 seed balls
