MASONS ARE WARNED OF K. K. KLAN

Grand Master Burke Will Discount ance Admitting Members Into Order

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.-A letter discountenancing admittance of the Ku Klux Klan into the Masonic order was ordered sent to all members of the order in California and the Hawaiian Islands by Dr. Samuel E. Burke of Los Angeles, grand master of the California jurisdiction of the order, who is visiting here. The letter

follows:
"To Master Masons, Wardens and Brethren of all lodges in the juris-

"Through the public press and other wise the Grand Master has been advised of the activities in California of an organization known as the Ku Klux Klan, or the Invisible Empire, membership which is said to be confined to native born American citizens, but AFTER SEWER FARM so secret in its workings that even the names of its members are not

the duly constituted officers of the law; a society which skulks and strikes in the dark, under cover of purchase of this land is now in escrew, and that the deal will be so un-American and un-Masonic in its methods as to merit the disapproval of thought, law-abiding, order-loving men.

"It seeks, by secret methods, to rectify what its leading members may conceive to be improper conduct on the part of the people not members of the Klan and to interpret the rule of conduct to be observed by non-members. Without regard to the courts or the duly authorized office of the law and to judge and condemn and execute its mandates by the dic-tum of a sheeted and hooded Klans-AMERICAN LEGION BREVITIES man, whose identity is hid from the light of orderly government by the people—in fact, and in deed, an organization assuming dangerous or whose views do not coincide with those of the Klan.


