Charles J. Chenu, chief of the division of motor vehicles, says that a great many operators of motor vehicles apparently don't know that Section 20 of the Motor Vehicle Act requires that proper signals be given by them before stopping, turning or changing the course of such vehicles, and if such vehicles are so constructed that the signals cannot be given by the use of the hand and arm so as to be visible, they must be equipped with an approved mechanor electrical device adequate to give three distinct signals as required with the hand and arm.

The use of a signal device that shows only the stop signal is in violation of the law and to permit the use of such a signal will lead to confusion in traffic and even-tually a disregard of all signals by the motoring public.
Section 20 also provides that no

person shall operate a motor vehicle so loaded or constructed as to obscure the driver's view to the rear, unless the vehicle is equipped with a mirror so located as to reflect to the operator a view of the highway for at least 200 feet to the rear of such ve-

A number of accidents and near accidents will be avoided if the motoring public will get a copy or synopsis of the motor vehicle act and study it until they know it, for there is no good reason to offer why a person who abuses the responsibility of operating a vehicle on the highway should not be familiar with the law covering such operation.

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
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
