

Banker From Lomita Makes Masterful After Dinner Talk (From Lomita News Letter)

Members of the San Pedro Ro-tary Club heard a wonderful talk delivered by H. V. Adams, cashier of the State Bank of Lomita, at their regular weekly lunchean at

their regular weekly lunchean at the LaBoheme Cafe. Mr. Adams' subject was "The Supreme Need of the Hour." He began by saying that the world today does not face any new prob-lems that previous generations have not had confront them, and that there has been practically are that there has been practically no difference in this regard for at least two thousand years, and possibly much longer.

"Human nature is the same." he said, "and the same troubles that confronted our fathers are fundamental and the same that exist today, chief of which is the desire to get something for nothing." Mr. Adams said the only way one can get help from another is for others to stir up in the breasts of those they wish to assist a desire to help themselves. One can-not lay in a hammock and become of fine physical perfection, but one must work to obtain such an end. No help can come to a man, according to Mr. Adams, except as he helps himself, and then he must not work for himself alone, but with a desire for service.

"The supreme need of the hour." said the speaker, "is not economic nor a larger navy nor a tariff al. though these may be important, but it is a revival of faith and a return to morality, which is its basis in religion. He said this sentiment does not come from a preach er, but it would be just as true if it did, but that it was written by the editor of the Wall Street Jour-nal, published in New York City. He said it indicates that the men of the country know the basic

need of this country. He put forth the idea that the best essential for credit is character, and that the fundamentals of prosperity are the ten commandments, coupled with the admoni-tion to "Love thy God with all thy heart and thy neighbor as thy self

In closing, he gave a portrayal of an allegory of the "Big Dipper," which is a masterpiece and wa was heartily appreciated.—S. P most Pilot
