"The Foundation of the Church" was the subject of the morning sermon from the text: "And I also say unto thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock wilt I build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

In the new Testament we find the church described under at least three figures of speech: architectural, agricultural and physiological. A building erected upon a foundation, the vine and branches and the human organism—Christ the Head and the Church the Body.

Here we have the first. The rock is not Peter, but his confession: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Because the confession exalts Jesus, we may say in fact, that Jesus Christ is the foundation. He is the Chief Corner Stone. The church is not built upon the learning, the eloquence, or the zeal of human leaders, but, upon Jesus Christ. The church is not the material building of wood or brick, or stone, but, the company—of believers who worship there. The church is the body of believers who love the Lord Jesus Christ, and serve him. All who then love and serve him are members of the church, no matter to what denomination they belong. Religion is not intended to be a minor matter of secondary interest. It is first: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness."
