date.

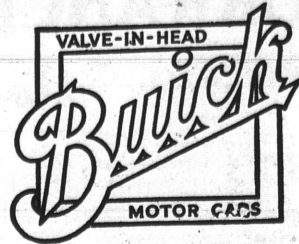
O. V. Kinder and family left Sat-

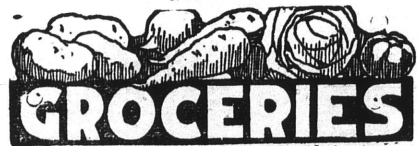
