# A STRIKING STATEMENT BY A FORMER ASSEMBLYMAN FROM MENDOCINO

You ask my views as to the "Wright law" passed by the last legislature, and now under referendum. You know that I have al hibition, on the ground that it was legislation in advance of public sentiment in many localities, and that, therefore, it would result in a disregard for the law, which, in turn, breeds disrespect for all law, and thus creates what to my mind one of the most dangerous conditions that can exist. What we need more than anything else is respect for law, whether we like the law or not.

I would personally prefer a law that makes a given territory wet or dry, as the people so vote While I was a member of the Legislature I consistently voted for a local option law, because if people vote a district dry, those same people will see that the law is

the National prohibition amend-ment has been adopted, and the Volstead law passed, even if I did not favor such a course, it is the duty of every citizen to see that the law is enforced. The Constit-ution gives the state the right to enforce the prohibition law concur-rently with the Federal Government and this right, to my mind amounts to a duty. Congress has said what may or may not be done under the prohibition amendmene, and in my opinion the state and every subdivision of the state should assist the Federal Government in enforcing the Volstead law. This is all that the "Wright law" provides for, and if the Volstead law is amend ed, the Wright law is automatically amended with it, and I therefore propose to vote for the Wright law. I was opposed to the Harris law ecause it went further than the

Ukiah City, wherein I reside, has voted wet on local option, but in conformity with the spirit that actuates all good citizens, is lending its aid to the Federal Government in enforcing the Volstead law, by adopting an ordinance in line with The same is true of the county, which Ukiah is the county seat, These local ordinances, however, have a limited scope, and a uniform state lay, such as the Wright law, would tend to equal enforcement throughout the state.

I am not one of those who be-lieve that it is wrong to oppose any change in the prohibition amendment or in the Volstead law, and if the people want to repeal the National amendment, or want to change the Volstead law, it is their privilege to do so; and in that I find the greatest reason for my support of the Wright law. If light wines and beer are permitted by and change in the Volstead law, the Wright law will also permit it. All that the Wright law seems to me to provide is, that so long as we have National prohibition, California will help the nation in enforcing it. The Wright law does not make prohibition at all. It accepts prohibition as a fact, and provides for its enforcement only to the extent that Congress forbids the traffic in intoxicants." W. D. I. HELD
