EUROPE WAS SWEETENED

For the nine months ending March 31, 1920, sugar exports from the United States totaled 1,030,571,794 pounds. For the same period in 1919 there were 543,703,767 pounds, and in 1918 509,938,687 pounds. Although the country was at peace, had no big army in Europe, and was not compelled to furnish abnormal quantities of food supplies to the allies, twice as much sugar was sent abroad than during the war when 2,000,000 American soldiers were in France and we were exerting efforts to send aid to the allies. There is evidently something radically wrong, and the principal trouble is the failure to buy the Cuban crop not only for refinement but for consumption in the United States.
