NEED OF BOY SCOUTS
IN EVERY CITY

What can we do to help the Boy Scout movement? How many of us have? If any of us have boys who are not members of this band, though old enough to belong, we can have them join. That will do some good to the movement and a great deal of good for the boy.

There may be just a bit of prejudice against the Boy Scout movement chiefly among parents who do not understand the movement—and more frequently who do not understand boys.

Every mother should wish her son to develop into a clean, honest, straightforward youth, physically stalwart, mentally alert, morally fine-garined. Association with the right kind of boys will do more than the text books of school or the corrections at home or the lessons at Sunday school.

Boys of a certain age will play in groups, and in their world of their own imagination will duplicate in miniature the progress of the human race from barbarism to civilization, from the primitive life of the caveman to the complex modernity of kodaks and wireless telegraphy.

The main idea of the Boy Scout movement is to educate the boys along the right lines in the play-

spells, teaching them the practical work of making campfires, pitching tents, doing outdoor cooking, scaling heights, swimming, building boats and bridges, studying the animal and plant life of forest and field, learning the mysteries of nature and practicing the methods of rendering first aid to those who are injured by accident.

Boy Scouts work willingly under the guidance and direction of an older leader who knows these things. They are apt and eager to learn. All any boy needs is to have someone direct his energies—of which he has a superabundance—along lines that are congenial to his tastes.

In the United States today about 4,000,000 boys are enrolled in this movement, which is ten years old. But there are 10,000,000 boys growing up who would be immensely benefited by the training and discipline which they would receive and who left to themselves are too often likely to develop into mischievous nuisances in their neighborhoods, graduating into gangs of young toughs and hoodlums, who pass from small evils to greater ones until they become fit for the reform school.

Scouting is democratic in that it knows no class or creed. It speaks the universal language of boyhood. It is the melting pot of youth in preparedness for good citizenship.

Boy Scouts learn to love their God and their country's flag and will make the kind of Americans that should populate this land.
