# COMMITTIES AGAIN GO AFTER PACIFIC ELECTRIC SHORT LINE TO REDONDO

### REPRESENTATIVES OF TWO CITIES AND THE REDONDO-DOMINGUEZ TRACT HOLD CON-FERENCE WITH OFFICIALS OF PACIFIC ELECTRIC; TALK OF BUS LINES

Many times during the growth of any city there are important announcements made of extensions of certain lines of trade, public improvements, and building activities that mean a great deal to everyone interested in that city; yet these announcements receive merely a passing glance, or the wave of a hand.

Now comes an announcement which all are interested in, that a move is under way to build an electric railway between Torrance and Redondo Beach. Whether or not anything definite comes of the move, it is significant that officials of Torrance and Redondo Beach are working on the plan and have held conferences with Vice President Titcomb of the Pacific Electric Railway. The Redondo "Breeze" has this to say regarding recent activities concerning the project:

Dominguez Tract had a conference with Vice President Titcomb of the Pacific Electric Railway regarding the construction of a short line beween Redondo and Torrance.

Last January committees from Re londo and Torrance met the P. E. officials and went into this matter, but during the period of re adjustment nothing was attempted along that line.

Within the past two months representatives of the Redondo-Dominguez Tract have, on several occasions, been before the officials of the Redondo Chamber of Commerce with a plea that efforts for the construction of the railroad be taken up.
