

## LOMITA BUSINESS MEN'S ASSOCIATION HOLD BUSY SESSION

It was moved and seconded and carried that the regular meeting be changed from Friday to Monday.

Mr. Hodge addressed the meeting and explained the gas situation in Lomita and Harbor City.

It was moved and seconded and carried that E. W. Brumpton be appointed as Official Collector for the association.

Under the head of New Business three new members were admitted to the association: Mr. Steigh, Mr. W. W. Wedgley, Mr. Herald.

It was moved and seconded and carried that the treasurer be notified to draw a draft for \$25 to pay for chairs.

It was moved and seconded and carried that the president appoint a committee of three to act as an entertainment committee.

The following was appointed: Hodge, chairman; Mr. Steigh, Mr. Antrey.

Receipts: \$3.

No further business coming before the meeting, a motion was made to adjourn, seconded and carried.

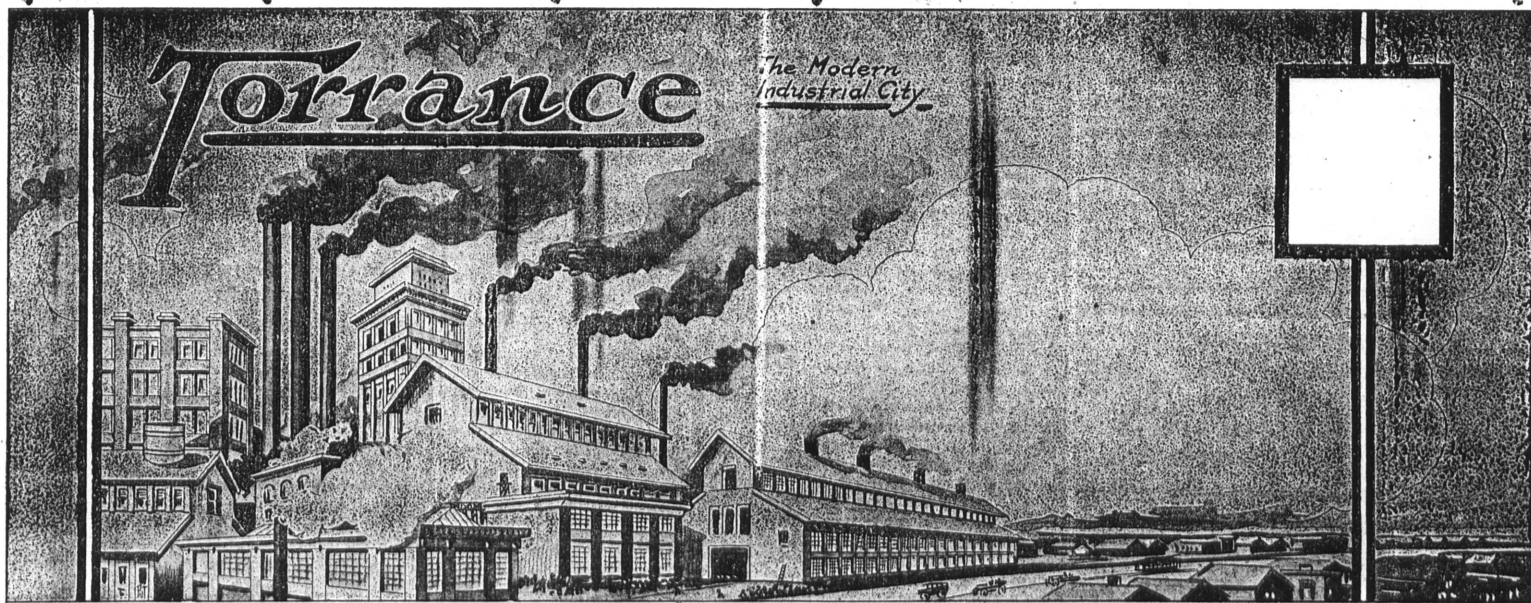
