## HOUSEHOLD HOMIES

## "Kitchenly Kindness"

That is a word coined by "Marian Harland," and I'm going to suggest a way to use it in your planning for presents to your housekeeping friends. As they keep the key to the cupboard they are interested in articles to fill it, so any of the following articles would make both pleasing and practical presents.

A small fruit cake or plum pudding or mince pie to the friend who does light housekeeping on a small scale would be a delight to her and not much trouble to you while making your own. As holders used around a gas stove get scorched and soiled, a set of three made to match the color scheme of her kitchen would please the friend who is too busy to make fresh ones often.

A jar of peanut butter.  
A jar of olives.  
A jar of olive oil.  
A bottle of salad dressing.  
A jar of honey.  
A box of fancy crackers.  
A jar of fruit.

Any of them wrapped in Christmas paper makes a most acceptable Christmas offering.

Ten there are articles for personal use.

A case of Kodak pictures of members of the family keep distant friends in touch with each other. A strip of cheese cloth in a fine weave, buttonholed with wool the width of an average sized bed, comfortably makes a protection for the end used near the face and can be laundered often.

A strip of white net a yard long and six inches wide sewed together when turned so the seam comes inside, makes a nice protector for the collar of a coat suit. The ends can be gathered a short distance from the end and finished with tiny crocheted balls. The one I saw was finished with a lace edge across the gathered ends. The owner said it was one of the most useful presents she ever had.

## Plum Pudding

One-fourth lb. raisins chopped fine; ¼ lb. suet chopped fine; ¼ lb. bread crumbs, ¼ lb. flour, ¼ lb. sugar; 2 eggs, some citron mixed and boiled in a cloth three hours.

## English Fruit Cake.

1 pound flour, one-four currants one-fourth raisins, 2 ounces of blanched almonds, 2 ounces butter or substitute one-fourth pound lard, 3 eggs and a little milk also a little nutmeg and different spices, the juice of half a lemon, 2 teaspoons of baking powder with the dry flour.—Mrs. McIntyre.

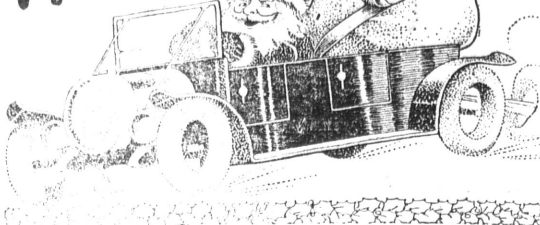
## LOMITA NEWS ITEMS
