FROM SEATTLE

Mrs. S. J. Seeley of South Narbonne avenue, Lomita, received a pleasant surprise last week when her son, A. D. Stonaker, eldest son of her first husband, drove through from his home in Seattle, Washington and stayed in Lomita for several days. This is the first time he had visited his mother in twelve years, being engaged in the contracting and building business in the northern city. Mrs. Seeley had two sons in the world war, Mr. Stonaker being a U. S. A. Lieutenant, while Ulysses Peterson son of Mrs. Seeley's second husband, was overseas eleven months and saw service at St. Mihiel drive with the 115th Engineer's Corps of the 40th Division. Also Mrs. Seeley's first husband was a first lieutenant under Gen. U. S. Grant in 1862 and was in the battle of Appomattox, the Battle of the Wilderness and Gettysburg, where he received injuries that ultimately resulted in his death. Mr. Stonaker's father was a captain in the War of 1812 and served with honors.

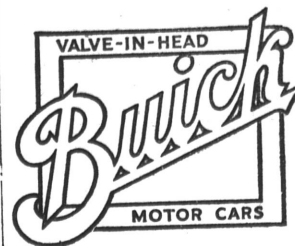
