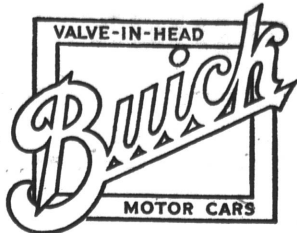

**ELECT BOY SCOUT CHAIRMAN;
CAMP FUND HAS OVER \$500**

Officers for district No. 9 of Los Angeles county Boy Scout work which comprises San Pedro, Wil-
mington, Harbor City, Lomita and
Terminal, were elected at a meeting
held in the chamber of commerce
rooms in San Pedro Tuesday night.
C. B. Hollingsworth was elected
chairman of the work. Vice chair-
men are C. P. Roberts, Lomita; C.
M. Bolin, Harbor City; Edwin San-
dison, Wilmington and Dr. Clayson
of San Pedro.

The matter of a Boy Scout camp
at the head of Gaffey Canyon was
taken up and it was announced that
\$500 was already available for the
work. A committee was appointed
to push the matter through. It is
composed of C. T. Wilder, Joe Rea-
gan, George Preston, George Towne
and E. L. Benton.

O. George Lake, county scout ex-
ecutive, made a splendid talk on
Boy Scout work, complimenting the
three San Pedro troops in high
terms. J. O. Heinley also spoke.

A publicity committee was also
appointed consisting of W. S.
Goldy, C. P. Roberts, C. F. Waite,
J. J. Sullivan, E. L. Benton, and Al-
bert Killian.

**LOMITA ELECTRICAL CO. GETS
CONTRACT FOR ALL WORK
IN NEW CITY**

The new Co-operative community
of Hammerton, that joins the in-
dustrial town of Torrance on the
east, and will own its own homes,
improvements and industries, has
just awarded to the Electrical Con-
tracting Manufacturing and Supply
Company of San Pedro and Lomita a
contract for all electric work to be
done in Hammerton, which includes
several miles of street lighting, the
wiring, lighting fixtures, and appli-
ances for five hundred or more
houses and the installation and
maintenance of all electric power
apparatus for the numerous indus-
trial plants.

This means many thousands of
dollars' worth of work and will
necessitate opening another branch
in that vicinity.

No doubt this is the largest con-
tract awarded to any local firm, and
deserves the appreciation of all San

**LONG BEACH TO INVITE THE
WORLD JAN. 31ST-FEB. 5TH**

Long Beach Cal., which only a
few years ago was a small seaside
without losing its charm for amuse-
ment seekers and vacation folk, but
rather while becoming increasingly
popular with them, has grown to
be a center of industry, with a
resident population of 55,593, ac-
cording to the 1920 United States
census.

To signalize its substantial
achievements, Long Beach will hold
an industrial exposition, January
31-February 5, 1921. Furthermore
a similar demonstration of its re-
sources and advantages will be
made an annual occurrence. It is
designed to focus attention upon
the industries of Long Beach and
the industrial opportunities which
Long Beach offers.

GET BOTH SIDES

We don't want to discredit boys

is apt to put the teacher in the
wrong light.

to train one child properly then
you can get a pretty good idea
of what the teacher has on hand
to train a flock of them. For that
reason you will take any wild story
brought home from the school-room
words, you will either fail to give
it serious consideration or, if you
do consider it, you'll be honest
enough to recall that there are al-
ways two sides to every story.
