500 YARDS OF CONCRETE POURED DAILY ON NEW TRUCK BOULEVARD

According to Supervisor R. F. McClellan, work is progressing rap-idly on the new truck boulevard that is being built between Los Angeles and the harbor. Five hundred yards of concrete are being poured, daily now, on the second section of the new thorough-fare; between Slauson and Comp-tor.

The third and final link, it is hoped will be completed within a year and, as far as the county is concerned, the highway needs of the business interests of the com-munity will have been met. It remains for the clty to do its part in the project and continue the road into the business district and to water's edge in the harbor. The new trade artery can well be called one of the best roads in the world. It is costing more than \$50,000 a mile. It is twenty-four feet wide. It has a subbase six thehes thick of rolled disintegrated granite. On this subbase a top layer of concrete eight inches thick is laid. And into this concrete are alaced three-eighths inch steel bars as reinforcement. Twelve pounds of steel to each lineal foot of road are used.

as reinforcement. I we've pounds if steel to each lineal foot of road tre used. The complete link passes through Compton. It is 2.44 miles long and cost 102,000. The link now under construction reaches from the junction at Alameda street and Slauson avenue almost due south to Burton avenue, just north of Compton. It is 5.097 miles long. Its cost will be about \$270,000. The third link will be from the southern end of the Compton por-tion south to Weston street, the northern boundry of Wilmington -5.74 miles. The estimated cost of this is \$400.000, It is splanned to continue this road into Wilmington as far as Anaheim street, where laterals will be connecting it with both the Main street and the Long Beach boulevards. Eventually the new boulevard is to be taken, by means of drawbridges, clear to Terminal Island. Into the city proper the council will be asked to prolong the road with the same type of construction north on Alameda street to the wholesale district. HARDING AND THE NATIONS

U. S. BATTLE FLEET 104 SHIPS IN THE PACIFIC

When the combined fleets of the Atlantic and Pacific assemble off the coast of Central America for their joint maneuvers next month they will comprise the greatest naval force ever concentrated in the Pacific Ocean. One hundred and four modern war vessels and twenty-two seaplanes will partici-pate.

The designation of the combined fleets, which will operate under Admiral Wilson the commander-in-chief of the Atlantic Fleet, will be "The United States Battle Fleet." After the two fleets meet in Pan-ama Bay they will sail to a point midway between Callao and Valpar-aiso for the battle maneuvers. The vessels designated to make the cruise consist of fifteen dread-naughts, thirty-eight destroyers, twelve'submarines, six tenders, two mine layers, two mine sweepers, six flagships for the destroyer, sub-marine and air forces and the fleet trains, and twenty-flive vessels for the fleet trains.




