are to be happy ourselves and make

only be remembered as they serve
to act as stepping stones to suc-
cess. You know we are never too
old to learn.

Here is a recipe that I've tried
and tested, and you'll never find it
to fail if you try it.

HOME MADE HAPPINESS

Prepare a real or imaginary
"Book of Blessings" with one page
for happy happenings, and another
for unhappy ones. And "doubting
Thomas" who needs to see it put
down in black and white to be con-
vinced that the good overbalances
the bad, would do well to have a
real "sure-enough" book with this
recipe of mine pasted on the title-

MACARON KISSES

Beat the whites of three eggs till
stiff, add a pinch of salt, and 2
cups of sugar by degrees, then stir
in 1 cup of cocoanut slowly. Drop
by teaspoonful on a buttered plate.

PICKLED ONIONS

Peel tiny white onions and let
them stand in salt water for a
short time then put them into a
kettle with 1 cup water, 2 cups of
vinegar and 2 tablespoonfuls of
powdered sugar and let them steam
till tender, and can while hot.
If spices are added, put them in
a sack to avoid discoloring the
onions.—Mrs. Mikelson.

APPLE SAUCE CAKE

1 cup unsweetened apple sauce,
1/2 cup melted shortening, 1 cup
sugar, 1 teaspoonful soda, 2 cups
flour, 1/2 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 each
cinnamon and cloves, and 1/2 of
nutmeg. 1 cup of raisins seeded
and chopped.
Mix in order given, sifting dry
ingredients together, beat well and
pour into a dripping pan and bake
about 1 hour in a slow oven.—Mrs.
Malone.
