The little lady who furnishes the recipes for this week has kept both heart and hands busy during her twelve months of wedded bliss. Even if it is true that "there is nothing new under the sun" she has proved that there are new ways of treating old things so that they appear like new by originating new recipes herself and making a study of those that have been tried and tried by others.

### CHEESE BALLS WITH TOMATO SAUCE

Mix together two cupfuls of grated cheese, one-fourth teaspoon salt, a few grains of pepper, and one cupful bread crumbs; then add one egg, beat lightly, add few drops Worcestershire sauce (if desired), and form into small balls; roll quickly in crushed cracker crumbs and fry to golden brown in deep fat. Serve on triangles of buttered toast and pour over them a tomato sauce.—Mrs. W. R. MacCormack.

### CARROTS AU GRATIN

Boil carrots until tender. Remove from water and slice thin. Add to white sauce which has been prepared by melting one tablespoon of butter and stirring in one tablespoonful of flour. When thoroughly mixed add one cup of milk, salt and pepper to taste. Fill ramekins with carrots and white sauce which have been thoroughly mixed and cover with grated cheese. Bake until cheese is melted.—Mrs. W. R. MacCormack.

### APRICOT TRIPLE

Line sherbert glasses with pieces of lady fingers. Fill center of each glass with white of egg whipped until stiff, to which has been added sugar to sweeten and pieces of canned apricots. Place half an apricot on top of each dish when serving.—Mrs. W. R. MacCormack.

### ITALIAN DISH

Peel and chop one onion, melt a tablespoonful of fat in a stewpan, and put the onion in and fry without browning. Then add a cupful of cooked rice and 3 cupfuls of white sauce. Boil down until thick enough to turn into greased flat pan. Form into round cakes and keep hot till eggs are cooked. Poach four eggs, drain and place on moulded rice, garnish with parsley and pour sauce around base.

### Sauce

2 tablespoons of butter substitute, 2 of flour, mix until smooth in a saucepan, then add liquor from ½ can of tomatoes. Season with salt and pepper, ½ teaspoon of celery salt and a tablespoonful of grated cheese. Let simmer for ten minutes.—Mrs. W. R. MacCormack.

### PARSNIP FRITTERS

Boil tender three large parsnips; mash smooth and add two well beaten eggs, one cup rich milk, one tablespoon butter, one teaspoon salt, three tablespoons flour. Roll in balls and fry in deep fat as fritters, or bake like pancakes.—Mrs. W. R. MacCormack.

### SPANISH OMELET

Melt one tablespoon of butter substitute and add one tablespoon of chopped onion, cook one minute and add 2-3 cups canned tomatoes, one teaspoon of salt and two tablespoons of cornstarch mixed with a little cold water. Cook five minutes, add three beaten eggs, and when eggs have thickened, serve on toast or crackers.—Mrs. W. R. MacCormack.
