HOW YOUR GASOLINE IS WASTED

Through exhaustive experiments the United States Bureau of Mines has demonstrated the startling fact that owing to improper car-bueretor adjustment on automobiles and trucks there is a waste of twenty-five to thirty per cent of gasoline. In other words, with proper adjustment, cars will run twenty-five to thirty per cent more miles to a galon of gasoline, thus reducing operating expenses, and far more important, conserving gas oline. Last year the state authorities

of New Jersey enlisted the services of the Bureau of Mines to solve the ventilation problem of a proposed tunel under the Hudson Riv er to connect New Jersey and New York and to be 8,000 feet from portal to portal. Improperly burned gasoline gives off a vapor color less, tasteless, odorletss and very deadly, called carbon monoxide. "Many passenger cars and trucks showed as high as 10 per cent car-bon monoxide in the exhaust. It is safe to cay that 25 to 30 per cent greater mileage could be obtained on the average of all cars tested with a little intelligent attention to the carburetor adjustment.
