40 TREES IN FAMILY ORCHARD

In less than three years from this summer the acre and a half owned by Judge Hunter on Beacon street, just west of his home, will bear an assortment of fruit that will rival many family orchards in Lomita when variety of yield is considered. Forty trees have been selected from choice nursery stock and will offer for canning and table use, oranges, lemons, grape fruit, tangerines, peaches, pears, apples, apricots, persimmons, figs, crab apple, plums, avocados, fejoia, besides the time-honored Carab tree of Bible fame. Special piping for irrigation will be laid so that each row of trees will be supplied with a slow stream of water, and especial care will be given cultivation in order to make this mixed orchard yield its fullest capacity.
