Over 2200 California boys were discharged from the service on account of tuberculosis.

The U. S. public health service has a great many beds available in good hospitals where a man may receive care and treatment.

The man may receive this treatment free and draw his compensation while he is getting well.

The Federal Board of Vocational Training will continue this help as the man improves in the Sanatorium and starts his Vocational Training.

Ex-Service men who are arrested cases of tuberculosis will be able to avail themselves of the Land Settlement Act.

Most important of all, with these agencies holding out a Helping hand it is up to every ex-service man to help locate these men so they can get well.
