So great was the distress in November that President Wilson appointed a committee of 130 prominent men and women to marshal American relief for aid of the sufferers. Churches, commercial, theatrical, and motion picture accociations,

benevolent societies, are asked to aid in the relief work. A check for \$1,200 was sent recently to Lee To, New York's "Mayor of Chinatown," by the Chinese of Pittsburg who are trying to aid their famine-stricken brothers in Northern China.


