

NOTICE OF TIME OF HEARING ON - PETITION FOR INCORPORATION - OF CITY OF TORRANCE

Notice is hereby given by the undersigned that the following petition will be presented to the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, at the regular meeting of said board to be held on Monday, the 7th day of March, 1921, at 10:00 o'clock a. m. of said day or as soon thereafter as said petitioners can be heard, in the office of said Board, in the Hall of Records of said County of Los Angeles, in the City of Los Angeles, County of Los Angeles, State of California.

Petition for Incorporation of City of Torrance

To the Honorable The Board of Supervisors, of the County of Los Angeles, State of California.

We the undersigned petitioners represent: that we are qualified electors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, and that we each of us reside within the limits of the hereinafter described proposed municipal corporation.

That the following is a particular description of the proposed territory to be included in the proposed municipal corporation, to-wit:

All that territory in the County of Los Angeles, State of California, within the following described boundary lines:

Beginning at the intersection of the westerly boundary line of the City of Los Angeles (Shoestring Addition) with a line parallel to and distant one thousand feet northwesterly, measured at right angles, from the southerly line of that certain 639.07 acre parcel of land allotted to Guadalupe Marcelina Dominguez as shown on map filed in Case No. 2284 of the Superior Court of the State of California, in and for the County of Los Angeles, thence southerly along the westerly boundary line of said City of Los Angeles to the easterly prolongation of the southerly line of Lot 1, Tract No. 530 as shown on map recorded in Map Book 15, page 13, Records of Los Angeles County; thence westerly in a direct line to the southeasterly corner of Lot 30, Tract No. 588, as shown on map recorded in Map Book 15, page 128, records of said county; thence westerly in a direct line to the southwesterly corner of Lot 16 of said Tract No. 588; thence southerly in a direct line to the southeasterly corner of Lot 7 of Tract No. 2200, Sheet No. 1, as shown on map recorded in Map Book 26, page 19, records of said County; thence northwesterly in a direct line to the southwesterly corner of Lot 90 of Tract No. 2200, Sheet No. 2, as shown on map recorded in Map Book 26, page 20, records of said county; thence northerly in a direct line to the southeasterly corner of Lot 100 said Tract No. 2200, Sheet No. 2; thence westerly in a direct line to the southwesterly corner of said Lot 100; thence northerly in a straight line through the northwesterly corner of Lot 101 of said last mentioned tract to the southerly line of Block 315 of Tract No. 1952 as shown on map recorded in Map Book 23, page 83, records of said county; thence westerly in a direct line to the southwesterly corner of said Block 315; thence northerly in a direct line to the northwesterly corner of Lot 54 of Tract No. 2675 as shown on map recorded in Map Book 27, page 33, records of said county; thence easterly along the northerly line of said Lot 54 to the southerly prolongation of a line parallel to and distant 20 feet easterly, measured at right angles, from the westerly line of Lot 56 of said Tract No. 2675; thence northerly along said last mentioned parallel line to the northerly line of said Lot 56; thence northerly and northwesterly along the easterly and northeasterly line of Madrona Avenue (sixty feet wide) as shown on map filed in Case No. B47845 of the Superior Court of the State of California, in and for the County of Los Angeles to the westerly line of the 2278.35 acre parcel of land allotted to Ana Josefa Dominguez de Guver as shown on map filed in aforementioned Superior Court Case No. 3284; thence northwesterly in a direct line to the intersection of the westerly line of the 639.07 acre parcel of land allotted to Guadalupe Marcelina Dominguez as shown on said last mentioned map, with a line parallel to and distant one thousand feet northwesterly, measured at right angles, from the southerly line of said 639.07 acre parcel of land allotted to Guadalupe Marcelina Dominguez; thence easterly along said last mentioned parallel line to the point of beginning.

That the number of inhabitants in said territory is not less than five hundred (500) persons and not more than three thousand (3000) but that the inhabitants in the above described territory number about eighteen hundred (1800) persons.

That said territory or any portion thereof is not included within the limits of any municipal corporation existing at the present time.

The undersigned petitioners believe that the interests of the inhabitants of, and of the owners of property within said territory will be promoted by the incorporation of said territory, and it is the desire of the petitioners herein that said territory within the above described boundaries be incorporated as a municipal corporation of the sixth class under the name of City of Torrance. Wherefore, Petitioners pray that said territory above described may be incorporated under provisions of that certain act of the legislature of the State of California entitled: "An act to Provide for the Organization, Incorporation, and Government of Municipal Corporations." Statutes of 1882, page 93, and all acts amendatory thereto, now also designated as Act 2348 of the General Laws of the State of California, as a municipal corporation of the sixth class, to be known under and by the name of City of Torrance.
