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ABOUT BUSINESS

We notice an article in a daily paper to the effect that business conditions throughout the country are not half as bad as some people would have you believe. The article was written by a financial expert, and he takes occasion to say that the business situation is largely a "state of mind."

We don't know how much stock the average reader takes in that sort of reasoning, but we do know that too much pessimistic talk does have and is having a bad effect on conditions. Usually the man who drives ahead in the belief that things are not as bad as reported, and who realizes that the situation in the business world could be much worse, is the fellow who is getting along best during these critical times. The business man, the laboring man, who stops to worry about what tomorrow may bring forth, instead of making the most of today, works himself into such a state of mind that he isn't in position to appreciate a change for the better when it comes.

There may be, after all, something worth thinking about in the statement that conditions are largely "a state of mind." at any rate, it is worth while looking around a little and seeing if the men who are succeeding best are the ones who prefer to look on the bright side. Comparing business with former years; comparing this country with Russia; comparing your lot with the other fellow's isn't going to get you very far in the right direction. Try smiling; try believing that tomorrow will be better than today, and we fully believe you'll find business conditions getting better from the very moment you start to do so.

TOO MUCH LENIENCY

The habit of officials and courts of extending leniency to men who submit to temptation, men who take that which belongs to someone else appears to be growing at a rapid rate in this state and, in fact, all over the United States. Leniency rather than punishment seems to be the rule which tends to make many others in positions of trust less careful than they would be if they knew a stiff prison sentence would be their fate if they strayed from the straight path.

We venture to say many others have been struck with the number of items in daily papers dealing with cases in which employees have stolen money within the past few months. And usually the story of the theft is accompanied by the announcement that the guilty party escaped with a suspended sentence.

It would be interesting to know just how far a suspended sentence goes toward reforming a man who has robbed others; how much he respects it and in how many cases it would be an effective bar against his doing the same thing again. If he is left off with the mere penalty of paying back that which he unlawfully appropriated, it is reasonable to argue that he would do the same thing again if he had a chance feeling it is easy to escape. Judges must decide what is best, but they should also remember that being too lenient sets a bad example for the other fellow. They should, of course, give the accused the benefit of the doubt. But they should also bear in mind that our laws are worthless if not enforced, and that however much they dislike to imprison a man there are many instances in which the community isn't safe with them running at large.

BEFORE YOU MOVE

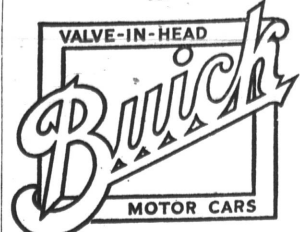
