PETITION TO MODIFY
BUILDING RESTRICTIONS

Believing that it is for the best interest of the City of Torrance, it is hereby

RESOLVED, That Mr. J. S. Torrance be asked by the Chamber of Commerce of Torrance, Cal., to modify the restrictions relating to three story buildings in certain sections of the city.

Resolved, That, it be made possible for a purchaser of any lot or lots in the business district to build thereon a one-story building of such texture that an additional one or more stories, as may be agreed upon may be added above the first floor as the needs of the purchaser may require.

Resolved, That, such smaller structures should be of such construction and design as to be a credit to the location and beautify and enhance the value of other property in the immediate vicinity of such building. And be it further

Resolved, That the Chamber of Commerce do all in its power to further the interests of the City of Torrance, as a whole, and to cooperate with J. S. Torrance and the Dominguez Land Corporation in the promotion of the beauty of our city in its parks, architecture of new buildings, streets, improvements etc., and to invite through this resolution the co-operation with us of the above mentioned parties.
