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DEMAND FOR LOCAL LIME PRODUCTS INCREASE TO RENEW LAND AND HUMAN RACE

"Throw out the lime-lime," has become the advice of scientists to the farmers of the country and one great educator in the East is authority for the statement that unless more lime is put into the soil strong-limbed athletes cannot be developed in this country as heretofore.

Thus it is that the announcement that more than 10,000,000 tons of decomposed marine shell lime has become available to the farmers of the West through the excavations now under way at the plant of the Torrance Lime and Fertilizer Company has been regarded as of immense importance to the State industrially and agriculturally.

Heretofore, it has been impossible to mine fertilizer running high in calcium and phosphoric acid content in this section, the chief sources of supply being the phosphate deposits in Florida. Now, according to Dr. R. O. Hall, it is probable, as a result of the discoveries of the deposits South of Lomita that California will be in a position to mine phosphate rock in sufficient tonnage to meet all requirements.

To meet the growing demand for its lime the company has already started work on a crushing plant which will increase its output from 100 to 2000 tons daily, making this one of the outstanding industries of Southern California.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR SOCIAL

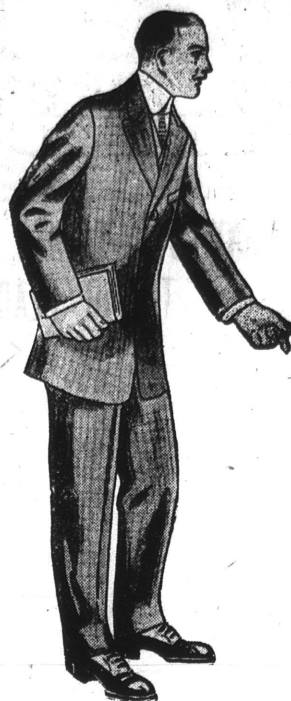
