IN HILLS

Lime Pit Excavations Permit Four Million-Year Glimpse Backward; Fossils Are Declared of Importance to Scientists

In the lime pits of the Torrance Lime and Fertilizer Company on the O. S. Weston Ranch there have been unearthed recently fossile remains hat scientists believe will cast new light on the antiquity of man and conditions existing on this earth 4,000,000 years or more ago.

Man has been delving into his ast, geologically and paleontolgolically, for centuries. Though he usually cerdited with better hindsight than foresight, by no stretch of the imagination have our scientists been able to have a look so far back. Consequently the Torrance Lime and Fertilizer pit finds are of the discovery of a so-called preserved numan foot, the lone surviving sev ige of the father of man.

In this connection, scientists point out that vestiges of prehistoric hunan life here are usually found near the surface, not in sepulchra caves, as in Europe. In other words, our American forebears seem to have liked it so well here that they kept pretty well to the open Perhaps it was sunny here then. just as it is today, living conditions were good in other words, though all that remains to prove it are dead

At any rate, Prof. Chester Stock eritable paleonologist for the Uniersity of California, announced that he will within a short time be ready to make an exhaustive study of the remains and has arranged to be present during the excavation a considerable period of time.

Dr. L. E. Wyman, of the Museum of History, Science and Art at Ex-position Park, who returned recently from a careful investigation of the pits, says that the evidence all points to the unearthing of high y important material from a period entedating the famous La Brea and San Pedro deposits, and also shedding valuable light on both of them. Although the deposits appeared at first to be largely marine in character, he said, careful analysis indi-cates that remarkable conditions existing there are due to the presence of animal rather than of ma-

He attaches particular importanc to the fact that phosphoric acid has apparently dissolved the tremendous shell deposits which were there, in such a way as to make an unprecedentedly large deposit of lime. The source from which this phospohoric acid came, he says, was undoubtedly the countless animals, which were piled up there.

Thus there results the unusual condition of animal remains being deposited in such quantities amid marine remains as to simultaneously dissolve the marine deposits and take from them a lime marl or encasement which would preserve through millions of years the bones of the animals responsible for the dissolution of the marine deposits. -L. A. Times.

CURIOUSLY enough, Ida and Ada are practically synonymous, according to etymologists. Certainly the names were used interchangeably. In early times, Ada was thought to be an entirely separate entity and was believed to be derived from Adah, meaning organical services and the services of the services meaning ornament, and the name Adah was given to the wife of Lamech in the Old Testament. But later etymo-logical authorities believe that Ada is merely a latinized form of Ead, mean ing happy or rich, and the same as the

bridegroom, Ortwin of Metz. A num-ber of feminine names came from Uote or Utn, and finally the name Adur was evolved. Andur was a viking Gaughevolved. Both Idn and Ada, the simplest terms possible of any feminine name, have been the basis of a number of other more involved derivatives. Some seem hardly eccognizable, as in the case of Othille, a name still very popular in Teutonic countries. The Original Othille was an Alsatfan virgin who was born blind but obtained her sight at basifiest.
