every family. Stuffed Onions.—Parboil or steam six Spanish onions, or other choice even sized ones, one hour. Remove from the fire, drain and cut the centers from them; scoop out the onion to oorm a cup. Chop fine the onion renoved, and pass through a sleve. Add

an equal measure of finely chopped veal or chicken, cooked; salt, pepper and a teaspoonful of minced parsley, one-fourth of a cupful of soft bread crumbs, one-fourth of a cupful of butter and mix thoroughly. Put a spoon ful of the mixture into each onlon, then add a few nuts—chestnuts are especially good if bianched and boiled unfit tender. Bake slowly one hour, basting four times with melted butter and hot water. Fifteen minutes before removing from the oven add a spoonful of buttered cracker crumbs on top of each and brown. Serve with a thin cream sauce, or a white sauce made by using one fablespoonsauce made by using one tablespoonful each of butter and flour. When cooked add one cupful of milk and senson with salt and pepper.

Delicious Cheese.—Rub the yolk of

Delicious Cheese.—Rub the yolk of one hard-cooked egg to a paste with a tablespoonful of olive oil or butter. Add one teaspoonful of salt, one of made mustard, one of granulated sugar, and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of cayenne. Mix with this two cupfuls of grated cheese, and one cupful of chopped chicken. Press scip scallop shells and bake until the cheese is melted.

Strawberry Bavarian Cream.—Soften one-half package of gelatin in one-half cupful of cold water and dissolve in one-half cupful of hot strawberry sirup; add one cupful of ber berry strup; add one cupful of ber-ries pressed through a sieve, three-fourths of a cupful of sugar and the juice of half a lemon. Sir until the sugar is dissolved, then let chill on ice. When the mixture begins to thicken, fold in one and one-half cup-fuls of cream beaten firm. Mold and serve cold, decorated with chopped pistachio nuts to be pretty, or other nuts may be used, and small me-ringues.
